MINUTES

of the

FEBRUARY 2022 MEETING

Rotary International Board of Directors

The Rotary International Board of Directors met on 22–24 February 2022 in Evanston, IL, USA President Mehta also called special virtual meetings of the Board to cover urgent matters on 26 January* and 8–9 March‡ 2022

Present were: President Shekhar Mehta, President-elect Jennifer Jones, Vice President Valarie Wafer, Treasurer Virpi Honkala, Executive Committee Chair Peter Kyle, other directors, Jessie Harman, Susan Howe, Urs Klemm, Mahesh Kotbagi, Aikaterini Kotsali-Papadimitriou, Roger Lhors, Vicki Puliz, Nicki Scott, Elizabeth Usovicz, Ananthanarayanan S. Venkatesh, and General Secretary John Hewko. Trustee Dean Rohrs attended as Trustee liaison to the Board. Won-Pyo Kim, Julio César A. Silva-Santisteban, Shi-Tien Liu, and Katsuhiko Tatsuno participated remotely. Also present was president nominee Gordon McInally. 2022 Council Chair Ken Schuppert presented on the status of the Council.

At the president's invitation, also participating were Directors-elect Alberto Cecchini, Jeremy Hurst, Drew Kessler, Muhammad Faiz Kidwai, Lena Mjerskaug, Patricia Merryweather-Arges, Patrick Chisanga, and Yoshio Sato.

Andrew McDonald served as secretary of the meeting with assistance from Matt Hohmann. Other staff present (in-person or remotely) were David Alexander, Jim Barnes, Julie Burke, Paul Haisman, Brian King, Mark Lowry, David Peterson, Steve Routburg, Eric Schmelling, Tom Thorfinnson, and Nora Zei. Nobuko Andrews, Alain Drouot, Marc Prevot, and Eiko Terao served as staff interpreters.

In addition to receiving reports on Rotary's Action Plan, Current membership data and trends, regionalization and empowering girls, the Board took the following decisions:

66. Ratification of Decision Made by the President

Statement: As authorized, President Mehta took decisions on behalf of the Board to fill vacancies in the office of governor or governor-elect, per the RI Bylaws.

DECISION: The Board ratifies the decision shown in Appendix A made on behalf of the Board by President Mehta during the period 11 September 2021 through 3 February 2022.

67. Ratification of Decisions Made by the General Secretary

Statement: As authorized, the general secretary took various decisions on behalf of the Board, including on such topics as admitting clubs into RI, amending club constitutions, excusing clubs from indebtedness, extending a governor's deadline for submitting allocation expense reports, extending a district's time limit for governor selection, modifying district boundaries, approving district incorporations, merging of clubs, canceling club charters, recognizing new Rotary Fellowships, and approving requests to join multidistrict information organizations, among other approvals authorized by the Board.

DECISION: The Board ratifies the decisions shown in Appendix B made by the general secretary on the Board's behalf during the period 18 September through 31 December 2021.

68. Minutes of the November 2021 Board Meeting

Statement: The general secretary distributed the November 2021 Board meeting minutes to each director.

DECISION: The Board approves the November 2021 Board meeting minutes as distributed.

69. General Secretary's Report

Statement: In addition to his written report summarizing Secretariat achievements in 2020–21, the general secretary reported on the work at the Secretariat since the Board's November 2021 meeting and progress on Secretariat initiatives during 2021–22. He also reported

on the upcoming Regional Leaders Global Institute, the Council on Legislation, the Houston Convention, the status of Polio, Rotary partnerships, and staffing, among other topics.

DECISION: The Board receives the general secretary's report on the activities at the Secretariat since the November 2021 Board meeting.

70. Treasurer's Report

Statement: Rotary Code of Policies section 29.040.6. requires the treasurer to report on the status of Rotary's finances at least once a quarter.

DECISION: The Board thanks Treasurer Honkala for her report on the status of Rotary's finances.

71. Communications from the Trustees

Statement: Trustee liaison to the Board, Dean Rohrs, reported that at their January 2022 meeting, the Rotary Foundation Trustees took several decisions of interest to the Board.

DECISION: The Board notes the following decisions from the January 2022 Trustees meeting:

72. Election of Foundation Trustee

Statement: In decision 32, November 2021, the Board elected Alberto Cecchini to be a Rotary Foundation trustee beginning 1 July 2022. After this decision, the Secretariat received the resignation of Director-elect Ezio Lanterni from Zone 14. As Alberto Cecchini was the alternate director elected by the clubs in the zone, he agreed to serve on the RI Board, thereby creating a vacancy in 2022–23 board of Trustees.

DECISION: The Board, following nomination by President-elect Jones, elects Greg E. Podd, to be a Trustee of The Rotary Foundation, beginning 1 July 2022 to serve a four-year term.

73. Petitions to the Board

Statement: The Board considered three petitions from Rotary clubs and districts:

- from the Rotary E-club of World Peace requesting the Board to endorse the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons;
- from the Rotary Club of Dhanmondi Central requesting the Board to reconsider its decision to nullify the governor election in District 3281 for 2023–24;
- from Districts 2130, 2140, 2150, and 2160 (Belgium and Luxembourg) requesting the Board to ensure that the next RI director from Zone 13 be nominated by only those clubs in section B of the Zone.

DECISION: The Board, the Executive Committee acting on its behalf, requests the general secretary to follow-through on the petitions received at this meeting in accordance with discussion at this meeting.

74. Zone 13B Director Selection

Statement: The Board's Executive Committee reviewed a petition from the governors of the four districts in Belgium regarding a dispute over the membership of the Zone 13B nominating committee that will be meeting in September 2022.

DECISION: The Board, having reviewed the request of the four governors in Zone 13B (Belgium, Luxembourg) to limit the selection of the 2024–26 RI director from Zone 13B to the districts in Zone 13B rather than all of Zone 13, and noting that:

- the current zoning plan adopted by the Board in 2016–17 created a new Zone 13 with the districts in France in Section A and the districts in Belgium in Section B and that at the time, the Board agreed Section A would have three director selections for every one selection from Section B;
- at its June 2017 meeting, the Board, in response to petitions from 22 Rotary clubs in Belgium to reconsider its decision to place Belgium and France into one zone, requested the general secretary to inform those clubs that by creating a

section of only Belgian districts, the Belgian Rotarians would be able "to elect their own director to the RI Board and determine their Rotary institute participation independent from the districts in the remainder of the zone."

• the campaign initiated by Director Lhors to encourage the districts in France to adopt resolutions at their district conferences agreeing that the selection of the 2024–26 director from Zone 13B would be made by all the districts in the Zone was undertaken on his own initiative without any input from the Board, is contrary to the expressed wish of the Board stated in 2017, contrary to the stated desire of other RI directors, the RI president, and general secretary, and unfair to the Rotarians in Belgium;

therefore requests the president, acting on behalf of the Board, to contact the governors of the 17 districts in Zone 13 that previously notified the general secretary that they agreed that the selection of the director from section B of Zone 13 should be made by representatives from the entire zone and request them to rescind their agreement and notify the general secretary accordingly no later than 1 April 2022.

75. District 2232 (Belarus and Ukraine) Election Interference

Statement: The Board was informed of possible improprieties concerning the governor election in District 2232.

DECISION: The Board, having received and reviewed the petition of Governor Volodymyr Bondarenko of District 2232 and the supporting documentation provided by six past district governors and several clubs in the district,

- 1. admonishes Rotarian Olga Zmiyivska for her attempts to influence the governor election in District 2232, which included offers of assistance in return for support of her candidacy;
- 2. by a unanimous vote, agrees that Rotarian Zmiyivska shall be prohibited from holding any RI offices or appointments until 1 July 2027;
- 3. requests the general secretary to inform the district of the above decision.

76. Updates to the Rotary Code of Policies

Statement: At the conclusion of each Board meeting, the general secretary reviews all decisions taken at that meeting and prepares a report listing the decisions that might be added to the Rotary Code of Policies. The general secretary provided suggested amendments to the Code based upon Board decisions taken at the September, October, and November 2021 meetings. The general secretary further recommended amendments to the Code to reflect current practices, language, and other factors.

DECISION: The Board, to record the decisions taken at its September, October, and November 2021 meetings, and previously, amends the Rotary Code of Policies as found in Appendix C, filed only with the official copy of the minutes.

77. Deferral of 2022–23 Committees Structure and Appointments

Statement: The Board typically reviews the presidentelect's committee appointments at the fall or winter Board meeting. President-elect Jones requested that review of her committee appointments be deferred until after the new RI committee structure is approved by the Board because this final structure would affect her appointments (see decision 79 below).

DECISION: The Board, noting that the recommendation of the joint working group appointed in November 2021 to develop committee terms of reference under the new RI committee structure would determine certain committee appointments, agrees to defer review of Presidentelect Jones's 2022–23 RI committees structure and appointments until after the February 2022 Board meeting.

78. Committee Terms of Reference

Statement: In decision 41, November 2021, the Board agreed to form a joint working group to develop the terms of reference for each of the committees under the proposed new committee structure. The working group reported that it needed more time to prepare full terms of reference for all committees but had agreed to focus its attention on establishing committee purpose statements necessary for the president-elect and chair-elect to begin the 2022–23 appointment process. The working group further noted that the 2022 Council on Legislation may adopt legislation affecting some committees.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. thanks the working group for its report;
- 2. defers consideration of the proposed committee composition and purpose statements until its June 2022 meeting and requests the president-elect to proceed with the 2022–23 RI committee appointments that can be made in the interim;
- 3. agrees that the Convention Committee, adopted as part of the new committee structure (decision 41, November 2021), shall be deleted and that the 2021–22 and 2022–23 convention committees shall be retained;
- 4. requests the working group to
 - a. continue its work on developing the terms of reference for the proposed committee structure;
 - b. review its recommendations following the 2022 Council on Legislation and recommend any necessary modifications;
 - c. recommend updates to The Rotary Code of Policies as a result of the adoption of the committee terms of reference;

for report to the Board at its June 2022 meeting.

79. 2022–23 Committees Structure and Appointments ‡

Statement: At a special 8–9 March meeting of the Board, President-elect Jones presented for the Board's review her 2022–23 committee appointments. President-elect Jones further noted that while the final new committee structure is still pending Board approval, some appointments could not be made at this time (see decision 77 above).

DECISION: The Board

- 1. thanks President-elect Jones for the review of her proposed 2022–23 RI Committee structure, noting those committees that are not included are pending further review;
- receives President-elect Jones' recommendations for 2022–23 RI and joint RI/TRF committee appointments as shown in Appendix D, filed only with the official copy of these minutes;

- 3. approves by a two-thirds vote the appointment of advisers as noted in point 2 above;
- 4. offers congratulations, encouragement, and support to all of the committee members for the next Rotary year.

80. Election Review Committee Report

Statement: The Election Review Committee reviewed four election complaints received by the general secretary since the Board's November 2021 meeting and made its recommendations regarding these complaints to the Board.

- 1. receives the complaint of the Rotary Club of Delhi South West, India, concerning the election of the 2023–24 governor of District 3011 and based on the report of the Election Review Committee:
 - a. finds that the allegations of improper electioneering, campaigning, and perceived procedural irregularities in the balloting process are without merit;
 - b. dismisses the complaint and confirms the selection of Rotarian Jeetender Gupta of the Rotary Club of Delhi as the 2023–24 governor of District 3011;
 - c. cautions the Rotary Club of Delhi South West against filing spurious complaints and reserves the right to take any additional action against the club in the event of further complaints;
 - d. thanks past RI Director Bharat Pandya for his efforts in supervising the voting process as previously requested by the Board;
- receives the complaint of the Rotary Club of Madras T. Nagar, India, concerning the election of the 2024– 25 governor of District 3232 and based on the report of the Election Review Committee:
 - a. finds that the candidate's activities set forth in the complaint represent the normal performance of duly assigned Rotary activities and do not constitute campaigning, canvassing, or electioneering;

- b. further finds that allegations concerning fake clubs and denying clubs' voting rights are unsubstantiated and without merit;
- c. dismisses the complaint and confirms the selection of Rotarian N. S. Sravanan as the 2024–25 governor of District 3232;
- 3. receives the complaint of the Rotary Club of La Piedad, Michoacán, Mexico, concerning the election of the 2023–24 governor of District 4140 and based on the report of the Election Review Committee:
 - a. finds that the 2020–21 governor acted inappropriately and exceeded his authority by arbitrarily adopting a club ballot procedure for selecting the 2023–24 governor after the district had previously agreed to adopt a nominating committee procedure;
 - notes that as a result of the governor's actions, one of the candidates who had properly been submitted to the nominating committee was not considered in the mail ballot;
 - c. notes with concern how few club ballots were considered valid and affirms that voting eligibility should not be contingent on the governor's official visit schedule;
 - d. upholds the complaint, voids the election of Rotarian Jaime M. Maciel as the 2023–24 Governor of District 4140, and directs the district nominating committee to reconvene as soon as possible to select the 2023–24 governor from among Rotarians José García, Enrique G. Vidrio and Jaime M. Maciel;
 - e. upon notification by the nominating committee chair of the candidate selected by the committee, directs the governor to proceed with the election in accordance with the RI Bylaws beginning at section 12.030.5.;
- 4. receives the complaint of the Manta, Manabí, Ecuador, concerning the election of the 2023–24 governor of District 4400 and based on the report of the Election Review Committee:
 - a. finds 2020–21 Governor Fernando Aguirre impermissibly denied seven clubs that had not paid their RI per capita dues and three new clubs the right to vote in the election in violation of the RI Bylaws;

- b. further finds that Past District Governor Aguirre violated RI Bylaws section 12.050.3. by taking possession of the ballots shortly after the election;
- c. upholds the election complaint, voids the election of Rotarian César Alarcón, and directs the 2021–22 governor to restart the election process to select the 2023–24 governor of District 4400 under the supervision of Director Julio César A. Silva-Santisteban.

81. Service Awards Committee Report

Statement: The Service Above Self Award is one of the highest honors a Rotarian can receive. Up to 150 awards can be granted annually for outstanding humanitarian service. Rotary annually recognizes one outstanding Rotary Foundation alumnus with the Rotary Alumni Global Service Award and one exemplary alumni association with the Rotary Alumni Association of the Year Award. The RI Service Awards Selection Committee reviewed nominations for these awards and submitted its recommendations to the Board. The general secretary recommended administrative policy amendments to further streamline the awards process.

- 1. approves the 133 recipients of the 2021–22 RI Service Above Self Award, as shown in Appendix E, filed only with the official copy of these minutes;
- 2. confirms that the selection results for the Service Above Self Award shall be kept confidential until the presentations of the awards have been made;
- selects the individuals shown in Appendix E (filed only with the official copy of these minutes) as the primary recipient and alternate recipient of the 2021– 22 Rotary Alumni Global Service Award;
- selects the alumni associations shown in Appendix E (filed only with the official copy of these minutes) as the primary recipient and alternate recipient of the 2021–22 Rotary Alumni Association of the Year Award;
- 5. authorizes the general secretary, on behalf of the Board, to designate the alternate selected for each alumni award as the award recipient if the primary award recipient cannot receive the award at the 2022 RI Convention in Houston;

6. amends the Rotary Code of Policies regarding the selection process for the Rotary Alumni Global Service Award and Rotary Alumni Association of the Year Award as follows:

Rotary Alumni Global Service Award 43.080.4 Selection Process [text omitted]

3. The recipient of the award will be notified about winning the award immediately after the January meetings of directors and trustees. Upon written acceptance of the award (including a commitment to receive the award in person at the Rotary International Convention), the winner will be announced to the other nominators and regional coordinators, and to the general public, as appropriate. The general secretary is authorized to designate the selected alternate as the award recipient if the primary recipient cannot receive the award at the Rotary <u>convention</u>.

Rotary Alumni Association of the Year Award 43.090.3 Selection Process [text omitted]

3. The recipient of the award will be notified about winning the award immediately after the January meetings of directors and trustees. Upon written acceptance of the award, the winner will be announced to the other nominators and regional coordinators, and to the general public, as appropriate. <u>The general secretary is authorized</u> to designate the selected alternate as the award recipient if the primary recipient cannot receive the award at the Rotary convention.

DECISIONS 82–96 2021 Council on Resolutions Requests

Statement: The 2021 Council on Resolutions met from 15 October through 15 November and adopted 15 resolutions for the Board's consideration.

82. To Amend RI Bylaws Section 4.080. and Article 10, Section 1(d) of the Standard Rotary Club Constitution to Ensure Consistency of These Two Provisions

Statement: The 2021 Council on Resolutions agreed with the Rotary Club of Chigasaki's proposal to align the RI Bylaws provision regarding monthly attendance reports with the timeline provided in the Standard Rotary Club Constitution. The Board agreed that this discrepancy should be clarified and requested legislation be drafted accordingly for consideration at the 2025 Council on Legislation.

DECISION: The Board

- thanks the 2021 Council on Resolutions for its resolution 21R-01 requesting the Board to consider amending RI Bylaws section 4.080. and Article 10, Section 1(d) of the Standard Rotary Club Constitution to ensure the consistency of these two provisions;
- 2. noting that the RI Bylaws provision requiring monthly attendance reports does not align with the timeline provided in the Standard Rotary Club Constitution for addressing absences, which could result in inaccurate monthly membership attendance reports, agrees to amend the RI Bylaws to be consistent with the Standard Rotary Club Constitution;
- 3. requests the general secretary to draft an enactment for the 2025 Council on Legislation to address this issue accordingly;
- 4. requests the general secretary to inform the resolution's proposer, the Rotary Club of Chigasaki, Japan, of the Board's decision.

83. To Amend the Recommended Rotary Club Bylaws to Encourage Clubs to Invite the People and Organizations that Have Benefited from its Support to Their Meetings

Statement: The 2021 Council on Resolutions agreed with District 1790's proposal to encourage clubs to invite beneficiaries of club programs and support initiatives to their meetings. The Board noted that the intent of this request can already be addressed by clubs without placing additional requirements in the club bylaws.

- 1. thanks the 2021 Council on Resolutions for its resolution 21R-02 requesting the Board to consider amending the Recommended Rotary Club Bylaws to encourage clubs to invite the people and organizations that have benefited from its support to their meetings;
- 2. noting that the Recommended Rotary Club Bylaws contain just the minimum standards for club meetings and that a club may update its bylaws with the provisions it deems appropriate, and further

noting that the Rotary Code of Policies 7.060.1. encourages clubs to invite guests to their meetings, does not agree to amend the Recommended Rotary Club Bylaws as requested;

3. requests the general secretary to inform the resolution's proposer, District 1790 (France), of the Board's decision.

84. To Place Renewed Emphasis upon Club Meetings and Providing Governors with Strategies to Encourage Attendance

Statement: The 2021 Council on Resolutions agreed with the Rotary Club of Kaibara's proposal for the Board to provide tools to governors for encouraging member engagement at the club level. The Board discussed the importance of a club's autonomy in pursuing membership engagement strategies that are appropriate for their region of the world.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. thanks the 2021 Council on Resolutions for its resolution 21R-03 requesting the Board to consider placing a renewed emphasis upon club meetings and providing governors with strategies to encourage attendance;
- 2. noting that in some Rotary regions member engagement strategies may be employed through encouraging club attendance, agrees that clubs should have the flexibility to develop their own engagement strategies based on regional appropriateness and not be mandated to undertake any specific strategy;
- 3. requests the general secretary to inform the resolution's proposer, the Rotary Club of Kaibara, Japan, of the Board's decision.

85. To Urge All Governors to Encourage Clubs to Acknowledge that Personal Service Enhances the Integrity of Rotarians

Statement: The 2021 Council on Resolutions agreed with the Rotary Club of Kaibara's proposal seeking to enhance member integrity by highlighting the importance of personal service. The Board acknowledged that Rotary's success relies on its members being engaged in service projects and therefore agreed that encouraging personal service in the district is a prudent task for governors.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. thanks the 2021 Council on Resolutions for its resolution 21R-04 requesting the Board to consider urging all governors to encourage clubs to acknowledge that personal service enhances the integrity of Rotarians;
- 2. agreeing that the best district teams are those where all members acknowledge that everyone's efforts are needed to achieve results, urges district governors to encourage their clubs to acknowledge that the personal service of its members enhances the integrity of Rotarians;
- 3. requests the general secretary to inform the resolution's proposers, the Rotary Club of Kaibara, Japan, of the Board's decision.

86. To Expand Rotary's Collaboration with Other Non-Profit Partners into a Worldwide Network for Service Projects

Statement: The 2021 Council on Resolutions agreed with the Rotary Club of Osaka's proposal to create a global network comprising other service organizations aligned with Rotary to focus on specific service projects and activities. The Board noted that its current multi-year strategic initiatives under development seek to leverage Rotary's partnerships, which would address key aspects of this proposal.

- thanks the 2021 Council on Resolutions for its resolution 21R-07 requesting the Board to consider expanding Rotary's collaboration with other nonprofit partners into a worldwide network for service projects;
- 2. noting that Rotary International is currently evaluating and planning a multi-year upgrade of the organization's global systems and tools to improve visibility, participation, and collaboration across constituents, which will take into consideration possible collaboration with other non-profit partners, agrees that no specific action should be taken at this time;
- 3. requests the general secretary to inform the resolution's proposers, the Rotary Club of Osaka, Japan, of the Board's decision.

87. To Include the Vocational Committee at the District Level

Statement: The 2021 Council on Resolutions agreed with the proposal from Districts 1810, 1880, 1940 (Germany), 1910 (Austria and Bosnia and Herzegovina), 1920 (Austria), and 1980 (Switzerland) that a Vocational Committee be among those listed in the Rotary Code of Policies that "may" be appointed in a district. The Board noted that while a Vocational Committee is not specifically named in the Code, the policy does provide for the appointment of other committees that "serve a *specific* function as identified by the governor and the district leadership team."

DECISION: The Board

- 1. thanks the 2021 Council on Resolutions for its resolution 21R-10 requesting the Board to consider including the vocational committee at the district level;
- 2. noting that it had previously streamlined the district committee structure based on feedback from district governors (notably that many had difficulties filling the forty-nine committee chair positions) and further noting that districts may appoint additional district committees as they deem necessary, agrees not to add any additional committees at the district level at this time;
- 3. requests the general secretary to inform the resolution's proposers, Districts 1810, 1880, 1940 (Germany), 1910 (Austria and Bosnia and Herzegovina), 1920 (Austria), and 1980 (Switzerland) of the Board's decision.

88. To Set an Upper Age Limit of 35 for Membership in a Rotaract Club

Statement: The 2021 Council on Resolutions agreed with District 1970's proposal for establishing an upper age limit for Rotaract membership. The Board noted that its own 2020 review of this matter concluded that an appropriate Rotaractor age limit was viewed differently in different parts of the world and therefore, it was best left to the clubs to establish an age limit for its membership most appropriate for that region of the world.

DECISION: The Board

1. thanks the 2021 Council on Resolutions for its resolution 21R-16, requesting the Board to consider

setting an upper age limit of 35 for membership in a Rotaract club;

- 2 noting that:
 - a. in decision 102, January 2020, it provided for Rotaract clubs to establish their own upper age limits (and agreeing that it is premature to determine if there are any adverse effects on Rotary club membership as a result of this new flexibility);
 - b. previously having an upper age limit in a Rotaract club had not proved to be a contributing factor to an increased transition in membership between Rotaract and Rotary clubs;
 - c. Rotary clubs may invite interested and qualified younger professionals or Rotaractors of any age to join their club as a dual member or to transition to Rotary club membership;

agrees that no upper age limit for Rotaract clubs should be set at this time;

3. requests the general secretary to inform the resolution's proposer, District 1970 (Portugal), of the Board's decision.

89. To Change the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) to Rotary Youth Leadership Academy

Statement: The 2021 Council on Resolutions agreed with the Rotary Club of Pullman's proposal to enhance the prestige of the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards by changing its name. The Board noted several limitations and challenges to changing the name as per the proposal and discussed how the club could locally address its concern without the Board making a global name change to the program.

- thanks the 2021 Council on Resolutions for its resolution 21R-17, requesting the Board to consider changing Rotary Youth Leadership Awards to Rotary Youth Leadership Academy;
- 2 noting that:
 - a. the term "award" is intended to signify that young people are "awarded" the opportunity to participate in this prestigious activity, both in

recognition of their accomplishments and by means of financial support;

- b. the term "academy" does not translate into all Rotary languages with the same intention as in in English, nor does have the same meaning in all English-speaking parts of the world;
- c. many RYLA programs around the world would likely experience significant operational or financial hardship modifying all of their marketing materials to comply with the new brand identity;
- d. individual RYLA programs are free to augment their marketing materials to articulate the nature of their individual programs, including use of the term "academy" while still preserving the official name of "Rotary Youth Leadership Awards" as an internationally recognized activity of clubs or districts;

agrees not to change the official name of Rotary Youth Leadership Awards;

3. requests the general secretary to inform the resolution's proposer, the Rotary Club of Pullman, District 5080 (Canada and USA), of the Board's decision.

90. To Change the Interact Club Application Deadline for a Rotary Citation

Statement: The 2021 Council on Resolutions agreed with District 9810's proposal to provide for a Rotary citation deadline that aligns with the school year in the southern hemisphere. The Board noted that while no schedule is ideal for all participants, the current schedule aligned with the Rotary year works adequately for a large segment of participants and further noted that the Secretariat strives to ensure all clubs can fairly apply.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. thanks the 2021 Council on Resolutions for its resolution 21R-18, requesting the Board to consider changing the Interact club application deadline for a Rotary Citation;
- 2. noting that
 - a. no Rotary Citation deadline schedule is ideal, especially for school-based clubs, due to the varying dates of school terms around the world;

- Interact clubs can be nominated for the Rotary Citation at any time of the year—except between 15 August and 15 October—and it is based on an honor system;
- c. the Secretariat makes reasonable effort to keep sponsor club presidents, advisers, and district governors included in all communications to ensure that they can support those sponsored clubs to make plans, set goals, and communicate between school years to have the opportunity to achieve the Citation;

agrees that the current schedule is sufficiently flexible to accommodate a majority of clubs around the world and that no changes are necessary at this time;

3. requests the general secretary to inform the resolution's proposer, District 9810 (Australia), of the Board's decision.

91. Requests to The Rotary Foundation Trustees

Statement: The 2021 Council on Resolutions approved two items requiring the Trustees consideration.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. thanks the 2021 Council on Resolutions for its resolution 21R-17 requesting the Trustees to consider amending the fourth area of focus to include senior health and 21R-18 to consider incorporating "diagnosis" into the Areas of Focus Policy Statements;
- 2. submits these resolutions to the Trustees for consideration at their next meeting.

92. To Conduct a Ten-Year Worldwide Campaign to Raise Awareness of Water as a Natural Resource

Statement: The 2021 Council on Resolutions agreed with the Rotary Club of Colón's proposal to promote the stewardship of all freshwater resources through a global awareness campaign. The Board noted that with several ongoing efforts, including Rotary's Area of Focus for Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene, the Environment Area of Focus, strategic and service partnerships, and Secretariat initiatives, Rotary is already raising sufficient awareness for freshwater-related concerns.

DECISION: The Board

- thanks the 2021 Council on Resolutions for its resolution 21R-23, requesting the Board to consider conducting a ten-year worldwide campaign to raise awareness of water as a natural resource;
- 2. noting that
 - a. Rotary's Area of Focus for Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene supports water resource management strategies to improve water quality by protecting and maintaining surface and groundwater resources, reducing pollution and contaminants, and promoting wastewater reuse;
 - b. Rotary's Area of Focus for Environment supports strategies to improve aquifer and groundwater recharging, water conservation, water quality, sanitation, and watershed management;
 - c. the Secretariat is working to build stronger water strategic and service partnerships to strengthen and promote Rotary's commitment to water as a valued natural and public health resource;
 - d. the Secretariat is continuously working to promote Rotary's commitment to sustainability managed water resources through: 1) the project activities of the water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) and environment (ENV) areas of focus;
 2) Rotary's Major Gift Initiatives in WASH and ENV; 3) area of focus global communication plans; and 4) the activities and advocacy of the Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene Rotary Action Group and the Environmental Sustainability Rotary Action Group;

agrees no further and separate campaign to raise water and natural resource issues is necessary at this time;

3. requests the general secretary to inform the resolution's proposer, the Rotary Club of Colón, Uruguay, of the Board's decision.

93. To Consider Encouraging all Rotarians to Oppose the Growing Problem of Modern-day Slavery

Statement: The 2021 Council on Resolutions agreed with District 1600's proposal to increase awareness of the problem of modern-day slavery and to encourage clubs

to engage in projects that protect victims of exploitation. The Board agreed with the concerns expressed in this proposal and noted that the Rotary Action Group Against Slavery should play a positive role in addressing them.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. thanks the 2021 Council on Resolutions for its resolution 21R-28 encouraging all Rotarians to become more familiar with the growing problem of modern-day slavery, to be vigilant and report suspicious activity in this regard, and to work towards solutions to end the practice in all its forms;
- 2. agrees modern-day slavery remains a pressing concern around the world;
- 3. expresses its appreciation for the efforts undertaken by the Rotary Action Group Against Slavery and encourages clubs to collaborate with the Action Group for assistance with designing programs that address the root causes of modern slavery and to support survivors' transition to a safe and stable environment;
- 4. requests the general secretary to inform the resolution's proposer, District 6000 (USA), of the Board's decision.

94. To Ensure That the Rotary Brand is Adequately Protected and That There is No Association of the Brand with Firearms or Ammunition

Statement: The 2021 Council on Resolutions agreed with District 7040's proposal that the Rotary Marks should have no association with firearms or ammunition. The Board cited multiple policy provisions that it felt adequately protected the Rotary Marks against such association.

- 1. thanks the 2021 Council on Resolutions for its resolution 21R-30 requesting the Board to consider
- 2. ensuring that the Rotary brand is adequately protected and that there is no association of the brand with firearms and ammunition;
- 3. noting that several provisions in the Rotary Code of Policies, including in sections
 - 2.100. Club and District Events Involving Weapons

- 2.110. Legal and Insurance Implications of Events Involving Weapons
- 34.030.15. RI and TRF Guidelines for Use of the Rotary Marks by Other Organizations
- 34.040.6. Use of Name "Rotary," or other Rotary Marks by Rotary Entities
- 34.040.14. Use of the "Rotary" Trademark, Masterbrand Signature, Simplified Signature or Mark of Excellence by Programs of Scale Awardees
- 35.050.10. Licensing of Guns, Weapons or Other Armaments
- 37.010. Guidelines for Sponsorship of RI Meetings, Events, Projects and Programs
- 44.020. Guidelines for Rotary Clubs, Rotary Districts and Other Rotary Entities for Interacting with Other Organizations

provide adequate protection for the Rotary Marks and ensure there is no association between the Rotary Marks and firearms or ammunition, agrees that no additional measures are needed at this time;

4. requests the general secretary to inform the resolution's proposer, District 7040 (Canada) of the Board's decision.

95. To Provide Training on Polio Eradication and PolioPlus to Incoming Governors

Statement: The 2021 Council on Resolutions agreed with the Rotary Club of Zonhoven's proposal to provide for more training on polio eradication. The Board noted the current training plan for incoming governors contains multiple trainings on polio eradication and that additional training on the subject was not necessary.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. thanks the 2021 Council on Resolutions for its resolution 21R-32 requesting the Board to consider providing training on polio eradication and PolioPlus to incoming governors;
- 2. notes that incoming governors have three training events: Governor-nominee Training Seminar, Governor-elect Training Seminar, and International Assembly; three learning plans in the Rotary Learning Center: beginning, intermediate, and advance; and many topics to cover to prepare them to lead their district for the year ahead;

- 3. notes that the Rotary Code of Policies section 19.040.5. provides for The Rotary Foundation as a Governor-elect Training Seminar topic and section 58.050.1. provides The Rotary Foundation (which includes the Foundation's work on Polio eradication) as a recommended topic at the International Assembly;
- 4. noting that the training for this year's class of governors-elect includes several opportunities for learning about the Foundation's polio-eradication efforts, including:
 - District Governor Basics learning:
 - i. eradicating polio is our top priority and basics of polio and what Rotary has done and will continue to do, including National Immunization Days and the Gates challenge;
 - ii. appointing a PolioPlus subcommittee chair is required and the role of the committee;
 - iii. importance of understanding the district's giving history to the PolioPlus Fund;
 - District Governor Intermediate learning plan includes
 - i. district planning guide which focuses on DDF and club contributions to the PolioPlus Fund;
 - District Governor Advance learning plan includes
 - i. SHARE system overview
 - ii. information on the PolioPlus match for DDF contributions;
 - Governor-nominee Training Seminar includes
 - i. a review of the different Foundation funds, including PolioPlus;
 - Governor-elect Training Seminar
 - i. includes key points and discussion questions on the PolioPlus funds;
 - International Assembly
 - i. includes update on the state of polio eradication;
 - ii. practice matching donors to different giving opportunities, including PolioPlus Fund;
 - iii. discussion on reaching TRF goals, including DDF to PolioPlus Fund; how to motivate clubs to support polio eradication efforts; how to leverage the legacy of polio;

agrees that no additional training on polio eradication or PolioPlus are needed at this time; 5. requests the general secretary to inform the resolution's proposers, the Rotary Club of Zonhoven, Belgium, of the Board's decision.

96. To Provide a Virtual Meeting Platform to Supplement In-Person Attendance at Certain Events

Statement: The 2021 Council on Resolutions agreed with the Rotary Club of Campinas-Sul's proposal for Rotary to provide a virtual meeting platform to supplement inperson attendance at events held in connection with Rotary Youth Exchange, intercountry committees, Rotary Fellowships, and other similar programs. The Board noted that a Digital Events and Engagement Task Force is looking into similar issues and could further take this proposal into consideration.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. thanks the 2021 Council on Resolutions for its resolution 21R-35 requesting the Board to consider providing a virtual meeting platform to supplement in-person attendance at certain events;
- 2. requests the Digital Events and Engagement Task Force to work with the general secretary to consider this resolution for recommendation to the Board at its April 2023 meeting;
- 3. requests the general secretary to inform the resolution's proposer, the Rotary Club of Campinas-Sul, Brazil, of the Board's decision.

97. Sunsetting of Fiscal Agent Positions

Statement: The general secretary reported that in an effort to streamline RI operations and reduce costs, a thorough review of all fiscal agents was conducted. Of the 10 fiscal agents operating on behalf of Rotary, the general secretary suggested that agents in four countries were no longer necessary.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. agrees to sunset the fiscal agent roles in Chile, Colombia, Peru, and Venezuela;
- 2. thanks the current and prior fiscal agents in these countries for their hard work and dedication.

98. Council on Legislation Board Advisory Committee Report

Statement: The Council on Legislation Board Advisory Committee met on 30 November and 17 December 2021 and 19 January and 8 February 2022 to discuss plans for the 2022 Council on Legislation, a review of legislation proposed by the Board, and an overall legislative strategy, among other topics.

- 1. withdraws the following items that it proposed to the 2022 Council on Legislation:
 - 22-25 To amend the qualifications of a governornominee;
 - 22-63 To allow Rotaract clubs to propose legislation and resolutions, and to permit Rotaractors to serve as voting members of the Council;
- 2. reaffirms the decision of the president and agrees to submit to the 2022 Council on Legislation statements of support regarding the following items of proposed legislation:
 - 22-10 To add equity and inclusion to the building of a well-balanced membership
 - 22-18 To state that Rotaractors may be members of RI committees
 - 22-20 To revise the timeline for president and director elections
 - 22-21 To amend the qualifications for director and membership on the director nominating committee
 - 22-27 To authorize the Board to remove a Rotarian's past officer status
 - 22-28 To revise the process for changing sections in a zone
 - 22-39 To amend the provisions regarding RI committees
 - 22-46 To increase per capita dues
 - 22-52 To amend the provisions regarding the Audit Committee and audited financial statements
 - 22-70 To modernize and streamline the RI Constitution without making any substantive changes
 - 22-71 To allow the Board to create pilot districts
- 3. reaffirms the decision of the president and agrees to submit to the 2022 Council on Legislation a

statements of opposition regarding the following items of proposed legislation:

- 22-44 To establish a two-term limit for the general secretary
- 22-45 To establish a four-year term for the general secretary with a two-term limit
- 22-93 To set qualifications and a compensation limit for the general secretary
- 4. authorizes the Board Council on Legislation Advisory Committee to draft the statements of support and opposition, to be approved by the president;
- 5. endorses the legislative strategy presented by the Board Council on Legislation Advisory Committee at this meeting.

99. Multi-Zone Rotary Institute Prague 2021 Expense Reimbursements

Statement: Reporting that the 2021 multi-zone Rotary Institute in Prague suffered financial losses due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Directors Honkala, Klemm, and Kotsali-Papadimitriou requested the Board consider providing a reimbursement to the institute for this loss.

DECISION: The Board does not agree to reimburse the Multi-Zone Rotary Institute (Prague 2021) for the net loss incurred due to lower registrations as a result of COVID-19.

Note: Directors Honkala, Klemm, and Kotsali-Papadimitriou were not present for the vote on this item.

100. 2022 RI (Houston) Convention*

Statement: President Mehta called for a special meeting of the Board on 26 January to consider plans for the 2022 RI (Houston) Convention, in light of the current status of the COVID-19 pandemic.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. affirms its intention to host the 2022 Rotary International Convention as an in-person event in Houston, Texas, USA, on 4-8 June 2022;
- 2. affirms its commitment to the health and safety of all Rotary members and agrees that all registrants must provide proof of their full vaccination status or provide a negative rapid antigen test result from a test administered by a medical professional or a certified

testing agency no more than 72 hours before arrival at the convention, and further that all registrants must follow all established health and safety protocols;

3. approves an additional promotional registration rate of US\$495 through 28 February 2022 and authorizes the general secretary to extend this discounted rate should market conditions warrant to encourage registration for the in-person event and adjusts the fee schedule as follows:

- 5. amends its decision 42, September 2020 as follows:

- 4. requests the general secretary to research the requirements for offering a virtual component to the convention that accomplishes the following goals:
 - provides more value to the attendees by offering access to the live event's content, post-event;
 - generates interest in future conventions by bringing in new audiences;
 - provides for the marketing of Rotary membership and other Rotary products;

and such virtual component to be offered using a paywhat you wish model, with 50 percent of proceeds going to the convention and 50 percent going to a

charitable component of The Rotary Foundation, as recommended by the International Convention Committee;

- 6 authorizes a registration fee schedule for the virtual component of the convention as follows:
 - \$50 from 1 March–31 March;
 - \$75 from 1 April through 8 June;
- 7. authorizes access of up to an additional \$3.1 million from the convention reserve to offset any additional potential losses;
- 8. requests the general secretary to work with the president and 2022 Convention Committee to reduce expenses and minimize the negative variance, for report to the Board at its February 2022 meeting.

101. Rotary International Convention Site 2030

Statement: The year 2030 is Rotary's 125th anniversary. Traditionally, Rotary has held the international convention in Chicago every 25th anniversary of its founding. The general secretary reported that Chicagoarea districts have indicated a strong interest in submitting a proposal to host the 2030 Rotary convention.

DECISION: The Board

- requests the general secretary to solicit a proposal to host the 2030 Rotary International Convention (Rotary's 125th anniversary year) from Chicago, IL, USA;
- 2. requests the general secretary to report on the results of this bid analysis, including whether to go forward with a formal site inspection, at the October 2022 Board meeting.

102. Habitat for Humanity International Service Partnership Renewal

Statement: Rotary began its three-year service partnership with Habitat for Humanity in 2018 to help connect Rotary members to experts in providing vulnerable populations with access to affordable shelter and clean, reliable water, to help provide skills for developing self-sufficiency, and to ensure these vulnerable populations have decent and safe places to

live. The Programs Committee reviewed the progress of the partnership and recommended its continuation.

DECISION: The Board requests the general secretary to execute a memorandum of understanding with Habitat for Humanity International, extending the service partnership for three years, contingent upon the Trustees' agreement to do the same.

103. Interact Advisory Council Report

Statement: The Interact Advisory Council met virtually on 6–7 November 2021 to discuss the availability of training for Interact club officers and possible amendments to the Rotary Code of Policies regarding Interact. The advisory council also received a report from a similarly structured youth advisory council at Lions Club International. The council recommended several policy amendments.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. thanks the Interact Advisory Council for its report;
- 2. amends the Rotary Code of Policies regarding Interact as shown in Appendix F to:
 - a) clarify the responsibilities of the district Interact committee and encourage appointments of Interactors to a district Interact representative position on the committee
 - b) define the purpose and goals of Interact
 - c) require parent/guardian permission for participation in Interact
 - d) define the role and qualifications of an Interact club adviser
 - e) clarify how sponsoring clubs may financially assist Interact clubs
 - f) require training for Interact club officers provided by the district

104. Annual Report on Partnerships

Statement: Rotary Code of Policies section 36.010. provides that the general secretary annually report on the status of all partnerships to the Board and Foundation Trustees. The general secretary reported on Rotary's resource partnerships with USAID, and the Power of Nutrition/Eleanor Crook Foundation; strategic partnerships with Global Partnership for Education, and the Institute for Economics and Peace; and service partnerships with Ashoka, Habitat for Humanity, Mediators Beyond Borders, Peace Corps, and ShelterBox. **DECISION:** The Board receives the general secretary's annual report on partnerships.

105. Club Naming Policy

Statement: In decision 111, January 2021, the Board requested the general secretary to implement changes to the club name review process, whereby clubs would be permitted to submit a club name that includes a thirdparty corporation or organization name provided that the club 1) has received written authorization from the thirdparty corporation or organization, 2) enters into a license agreement with the third party for use of the corporation's or organization's trademark (which includes RI's standard agreement terms), and 3) maintains insurance for the duration of the agreement. The general secretary reported that since implementing this new policy, which further included certification that the club will operate without undue influence by the third-party organization, several inquiries about establishing this club had been received but no clubs had yet followedthrough accordingly to add a third party name to their Rotary club's name.

DECISION: The Board receives the general secretary's report on the implementation of the club name review process for use of a third party organization's trademark or name.

106. Districting Committee Report

Statement: In decision 61, November 2021, the Board deferred consideration of the Districting Committee's recommendation to split District 3054 (India) into two districts by 2023. The committee reported corresponding with district leadership about reorganization requirements and further discussed the viability of the district's proposed reorganization plans in view of recent district membership growth. The committee recommended that the district be split.

DECISION: The Board, acknowledging local district growth efforts, tentatively agrees to split District 3054 (India) into Districts 3055 and 3056, effective 1 July 2023, as follows:

District 3055 – INDIA, part of Gujarat and Rajasthan revenue districts including Ahmedabad, Aravali, Banaskantha, Barmer, Gandhinagar, Jalore, Jaisalmer, Kutch, Mehsana, Patan, Sabarknatha, and Sirohi

District 3056 – INDIA, part of Rajasthan revenue districts including Banswara, Bhilwara, Bundi, Chittorgarh, Dausa, Dungarpur, Jaipur, Jhalawar, Karauli, Kota, Pali, Pratapgarh, Rajsamand, Sawaimadhopur, Sikar, Tonk, Udaipur

provided that the district has 20 members or more in at least 80 percent of its clubs by 1 July 2022.

107. Zone 8 Regionalization Pilot

Statement: The Shaping Rotary's Future Committee reviewed a proposed regionalization model in Zone 8 (Australia, New Zealand, Pacific Islands) that aims to establish a new governance model in the zone. The committee suggested that the Board approve this proposal on a pilot basis.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. thanks the Shaping Rotary's Future Committee for its report;
- 2. approves in principle the pilot proposal for a new regional governance structure for Zone 8, as shown in Appendix G (filed only with the official copy of these minutes), subject to:
 - a. approval of the pilot on or before 1 October 2022 by the districts and clubs in Zone 8 (such approval to be consistent with the requirements for multi-district organizations);
 - b. a later review of Rotary International's costs to support the pilot;
- 3. requests the general secretary prepare an estimated cost for supporting the pilot Zone 8 regional governance structure, for report at October 2022 Board meeting.

108. COL Enactment 22-71 To Provide for the Administration of Clubs in a Pilot District

Statement: Noting that it had previously agreed to submit legislation (enactment 22-71) to the 2022 Council on Legislation that would provide for the administration of clubs in a regionalization pilot, the Board discussed amending this enactment to limit participation in the pilot to only Zone 8 (Australia, New Zealand, Pacific Islands) and RIBI, as these areas had already done substantial work developing their regionalization structures.

DECISION: The Board amends its proposed enactment 22-71 to the 2022 Council on Legislation (To provide for the administration of clubs in a pilot district) as shown in Appendix H.

109. Triennial Review of Countries Exempt from Magazine Subscription

Statement: The RI Bylaws provides for the exemption from the subscription to the *Rotary* magazine (or regional magazine where available) if the members are not literate in the language of the available magazine. The Communications Committee reviewed the list of countries where this exemption is applicable.

DECISION: The Board receives the general secretary's report on the following countries exempted from Rotary magazine subscription:

110. Investment Committee Report

Statement: The Investment Committee met on 11 November 2021 to discuss investment performance, investment allocations to the RI portfolio, the 2023 investment return assumptions, possible amendments to the Statement of Investment Policy and Guidelines, and current investment strategies among other topics.

DECISION: The Board

1. amends the Statement of Investment Policy and Guidelines regarding the liquidity guidelines as follows:

> Up to 5% of the portfolio, measured at the time an investment is made, may be held in investments that restrict the availability of funds. The Rotary International portfolio will be invested in investments that are generally liquid. Investments in and commitments to closed end funds are prohibited. The entirety of the investment portfolio balance should be accessible and liquid within one year.

- 2. approves the responsible investment principles as shown in Appendix I and requests the general secretary to incorporate these principles into the Statement of Investment Policy and Guidelines governing the management of the RI portfolio;
- 3. thanks the Investment Committee for its report.

111. Audit Committee Report

Statement: The Audit Committee met virtually on 11 January 2022 to discuss recently completed audits, a summary of management action plans from previous audits, and an evaluation of the external auditor, among other topics.

DECISION: The Board thanks the Audit Committee for its report.

112. Finance Committee Report: Membership Dues Increase‡

Statement: President Mehta called a special meeting on 8–9 March 2022 to discuss a possible necessary amendment to Council Enactment 22-46 regarding a Rotary membership dues increase that the Board had previously agreed to submit to the 2022 Council.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. thanks the Finance Committee for its report;
- 2. confirms the committee's update regarding the impact on the five-year forecast of various membership dues increase scenarios for fiscal years 2024, 2025, and 2026;
- 3. revises Council enactment 22-46 "To increase per capita dues" as follows:

18.030. Dues.

18.030.1. Per Capita Dues.

Each club pays per capita dues to RI for each member as follows: US\$34.00 per half year in 2019 – 20, US\$34.50 per half year in 2020 21, US\$35.00 per half year in 2021 – 22, and US\$35.50 per half year in 2022–23, US\$36.50 US\$37.50 per half year in 2023– 24, US\$37.50 US\$39.25 per half year in 2024 - 25, and US\$38.50 US\$41.00 per half year in 2025–26, and thereafter. The dues shall remain constant until changed by the council on legislation.

113. Finance Committee Report

Statement: The Finance Committee met virtually on 31 March 2022 to discuss current expense trends, 2022 projected budget actuals, aspects of 2023 Rotary budget, and a digital transformation strategy aimed at enhancing the participant experience through technology, among other topics.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. thanks the Finance Committee for its report;
- 2. agrees to the 2022–23 budget assumptions on membership and net investment return, as shown in Appendix J, filed only with the official copy of these minutes;
- 3. approves the 2022–23 district governors funding budget of US\$9,405,236;
- 4. approves the 2022–23 Melbourne Convention budget as follows:
 - a. \$12,014,000 in revenues and \$12,581,000 in expenses;
 - b. \$1,072,000 of the budgeted expense to be covered from the Convention Reserve for direct staffing allocation and virtual component;
 - c. a registration fee based upon 17,000 registrants with corresponding registration fees.

AMENDMENTS TO ROTARY CODE OF POLICIES REGARDING INTERACT (Decision 103)

17.030.2. District Committees [text omitted]

- Interact Committee
- 1. Purpose: The district Interact committee, composed of Rotarians, Rotaractors, and Interactors, promotes and supports the activities of Interact clubs.
- 2. Additional Qualifications of Members:

Preference should be given to those who have club-level experience with Interact, <u>Interact advisor</u>, Interact alumni, and Interact members with leadership potential. Participation of Interactors is contingent upon receiving prior approval from a parent/guardian. Where feasible and practicable there should be provision for continuity of membership by appointing one or more members for a second term.

- 3. Duties and Responsibilities:
 - a) Coordinate districtwide activities related to Interact.
 - b) Promote program participation through regular contact with assistant governors and clubs.
 - c) Promote Interact by inviting participants to speak at events and encourage clubs to get involved.
 - d) Support the organization of new Interact clubs.
 - e) Provide training and support to Interact club advisors, including youth protection.
 - f) Oversee other administrative functions of Interact clubs within the district.
 - g) <u>Liaise with other youth-serving district committees (e.g. RYLA and Youth Exchange) to</u> <u>encourage participation and collaboration in all</u> youth programs and to strengthen youth protection district wide.
- 4. Appointment of Chair:

The district Interact Committee chair (a Rotarian or Rotaractor), appointed by the governor, and the district Interact representative (an Interactor), elected by the Interact clubs in the district (as described in Code section 41.010), should serve as co-chairs of this committee. It is highly recommended that districts use a leadership succession plan, consulting all members of the committee as well as the governor-elect and governor-nominee, to draw from the expertise of experienced committee members and develop leaders within the committee. The plan should also arrange for an overlap period, so that incoming chairs learn important procedures and policies from their predecessors.

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41.010. Interact

Interact is a program of Rotary International, adopted by the Board in June 1962.

The "Interact Statement of Policy" is as follows:

1.—The Interact program was developed and created by and is an activity of Rotary International, and the authority for the establishment and enforcement of constitutional provisions, organizational requirements and standards of procedure, and for the protection and preservation of the Interact name and logo is retained by Rotary International.

41.010.1. Purpose and Outcomes

- 1. The purposes of Interact are for:
 - a) sponsor club members to recognize the positive change implemented by youth and young adults as the fifth Avenue of Service, Youth Service, through an active and personal commitment to empower young people to take action through community and international service, develop leadership skills, and gain a global perspective that fosters world peace and cultural understanding; and for
 - b) students and youth to take action through community and international service, discover new cultures and promote international understanding as global citizens, develop skills to become school and community leaders, make friends locally and globally, and have fun while recognizing the importance of Service Above Self.

- 2. The goals of Interact are (but not limited) to:
 - a) instill in young people a life-long commitment to service through youth-led activities that address local needs, especially those aligned with Rotary's Areas of Focus.
 - b) guide young people to learn about other cultures, participate in International projects, and understand the global scope of Rotary, especially aligned with Rotary's commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion.
 - c) develop youth leadership skills by promoting youth voice and empowering young people to become club and district leaders.
 - d) fulfill Rotary's commitment to youth service by engaging our members to provide safe, meaningful, and impactful opportunities for young people to learn and grow.
- 41.010.2. Membership in an Interact Club
- <u>1.2.</u> An Interact club is a Rotary club sponsored organization of young people, ages 12 to 18, whose purpose is to provide opportunity for them to work together in a world fellowship dedicated to service and international understanding and leadership development skills.
- 2. Admission to membership of an Interact club is contingent on the prior approval by a parent/guardian and such permission can be revoked at any time.
- 3. 11. On 30 June of the Rotary year in which a member becomes 18 years old or upon graduation, whichever is later, his or her Interact membership will end, without contradicting regulations and policies established by the school authorities for schoolconnected clubs.
- 4. Interact clubs are encouraged to adopt a code of conduct for members, consistent with the Code of Conduct for Rotary members and in accordance with Rotary's youth protection policies, which include grounds for termination to be included in their club bylaws.

41.010.3. Sponsorship

<u>1.3</u>. An Interact club is organized, sponsored and supervised by a Rotary club and is established

following the endorsement of the governor and upon certification and recognition by Rotary International; and its continued existence depends upon the continued sponsorship of at least one sponsor Rotary club and continued recognition by Rotary International.

- a) An Interact club may be organized and sponsored jointly by a Rotary club and another Rotary club or a Rotaract club as long as the total number of co-sponsors does not exceed three clubs; and
- b) Sponsoring Rotary and Rotaract clubs must be within the boundaries of the district in which the Interact club is located.

Interact clubs may be sponsored jointly by more than three clubs with the governor's approval if, in the governor's considered judgment, the best interests of the district, the Rotary clubs, Rotaract clubs, and the Interact club concerned would be effectively served.

A joint Interact committee should be created with representation from each of the sponsor clubs.

2.4. Sponsor clubs are responsible for organizing the Interact club and for providing it with guidance and counsel thereafter and have complete control and supervision over all activities, policies, and programs of the Interact club.

41.010.4 Interact club base

1. An Interact club may be community or school-based.

- <u>2.5.</u> Where the Interact club is school-connected, control and supervision by the sponsor clubs shall be exercised in full cooperation with the school authorities, with the understanding that such clubs are subject to the same regulations and policies established by the school authorities for all student organizations and extracurricular activities of the school.
- <u>3.</u> 22. As a matter of principle, Interact clubs are not authorized to assume membership in or merge with other organizations regardless of the purpose of such organizations.

41.010.5. Interact club advisor

1. Rotary clubs shall appoint an Interact club advisor to supervise, guide, and support the Interact club.

- 2. The Interact club advisor may be a member of the sponsor Rotary or Rotaract club, an adult nonmember vetted by the sponsor club(s), or in the case of school-based Interact clubs, a member of the faculty or administration of the school.
- 3. An Interact club may have more than one Interact club adviser, however only one Interact club adviser may be reported to Rotary International and must be reported on an annual basis for the Interact club to maintain an active status.
- 4. All Interact club advisers should be screened, vetted, and trained to uphold Rotary's youth protection policies.

41.010.6 Standard Interact Club Constitution and Recommended Interact Club Bylaws

- <u>1.-8</u>. There shall be a "Standard Interact Club Constitution" prescribed by Rotary International and subject to amendment only by the Board of Directors of Rotary International. As a prerequisite of its organization and certification, each Interact club shall adopt the "Standard Interact Club Constitution" and shall automatically adopt all amendments thereto subsequently made by the Board of Directors of Rotary International.
- 2.9. Each Interact club shall adopt by-laws not inconsistent with the "Standard Interact Club Constitution" and with policy established by Rotary International. Such by-laws shall be subject to the approval of the sponsor club(s).
- <u>3.10.</u> Each member of an Interact club, by his or her acceptance of membership, agrees to accept and to adhere to the provisions of the constitution and by-laws of the Interact club.

41.010.7. Interact Club Suspension and Termination

- 1.14. An Interact club may be terminated (a) by Rotary International, with or without the consent, approval or concurrence of the sponsor club(s), for failure to function in accordance with its constitution or for other cause, (b) by its sponsor club(s), or (c) by the Interact club itself upon its own determination.
- <u>2.15.</u> Upon termination of an Interact club, all rights and privileges relating to the name and logo shall be relinquished by the club and by its members individually and collectively.

41.010.8 Interact Marks

13. An Interact club member shall be entitled to use and display the Interact name and logo in an appropriate and dignified manner during the period of his or her membership in an Interact club and he or she shall relinquish such entitlement upon termination of his or her membership in his or her Interact club or upon the termination of <u>his or her the</u> Interact club <u>in</u> <u>conformity with the Rotary Code of Policies Article</u> 34.060.4.

41.010.9. Interact Club Finances

- 1. Individual Interactors may pay annual membership fees to their club to cover the cost of club administration, as provided for in their club bylaws.
- 2. Any fees, dues or assessments on the membership of any Interact club shall be nominal and shall be only for the purpose of covering the cost of administering the club.
- 3. Funds for activities and projects undertaken by Interact clubs shall be raised by such clubs apart from membership fees, dues or assessments and shall be placed into a separate account
- <u>4.</u> <u>19. c)</u> Costs involved in arranging any meetings of Interact clubs or groups of Interact clubs should be kept as low as possible consistent with effective meetings and a meaningful program.
- 5. 19 d) It is the responsibility of the Interact club to raise the funds necessary to carry out the program of the club; however, sponsor clubs may provide financial support when mutually agreed upon.
- 6. 19. f) Interact clubs <u>may occasionally request</u> <u>support for club activities, service projects, or</u> <u>fundraisers, but</u> should not make <u>repeated</u> general solicitations for financial assistance from Rotary clubs, Rotaract clubs, or from other Interact clubs.
- 7. 19. g) Sponsor clubs should establish financial guidelines for Interact clubs to ensure that all funds are managed in a responsible and transparent manner, including all monies collected to support service projects, consistent with laws and banking regulations in the country. This should include providing oversight for an adult signatory on all accounts, and plans for disbursement of funds should the Interact club disband or be terminated.

- 8. No part of the expenses of meetings of Interact clubs shall be paid by Rotary International.
- 41.010.10. Interact Club Activities
- <u>1.</u> 6. All Interact club activities, projects, and programs shall at all times be conducted in harmony with the policies of Rotary International; continued sponsorship of an Interact club by a Rotary club and recognition of it by RI are contingent thereon.
- 2. 7. All online activities, such as the club website and social media pages, <u>and virtual meetings</u> shall be operated in accordance with applicable law and regulations; sponsor clubs shall obtain written consent of Interactors' parents or legal guardians in advance of Interact participation as necessary.

41.010.11. Interact District Meetings and Activities

- 1. District Governor authority: The governor is responsible for all Interact events within the district, and the district Interact Committee shall report to the governor.
- 2. District Interact Committee: District governors are encouraged to appoint a district Interact committee as noted in Rotary Code of Policies section 17.030.3.
- <u>3.</u> <u>17.</u> <u>Interact organization beyond the club level</u> <u>District Interact Representative</u>
 - a)A district with two or more Interact clubs may elect a district Interact representative from among its membership. The method of election shall be determined by the district Interact committee and district governor in advance of elections.
 - b) All election disputes shall be resolved locally by the district governor based on district policy in consultation with the district Interact chair. RI will not intervene.
 - c)The district Interact representative will be guided and counseled by the district governor and the district Interact committee, or other appropriate district committee, shall give counsel to and provide encouragement and inspiration to the Interact clubs of the district, particularly with respect to broadening and deepening the program of Interact within the district, and shall help focus their attention on the potential and achievements of the program in support of international understanding.

- <u>4.18.</u> Interact meetings beyond the club level <u>District</u> Interact Meetings and Activities
 - a) District Interact conferences may be held, under the guidance of the district Interact committee, with one or more members of this committee present. The district Interact representative shall assist the district committee in arranging these meetings and, where possible, shall preside at such meetings.
 - b) The purpose of a district Interact conference is to provide training, encouragement, enlightenment, and inspiration to the Interact clubs with respect to school and Community Service and to focus attention on the worldwide potential and achievements of Interact on behalf of international understanding.
 - c) No meeting of members of Interact clubs beyond the club level shall have any legislative authority nor shall be so organized or conducted as to give the appearance of having such authority. Nevertheless, such a meeting may include the opportunity for expression of ideas which might be of value as advisory observations to those who are involved at the district or other levels with the administration of Interact.
 - d) The chair of the district Interact Committee and the district Interact representative should facilitate a leadership training seminar for all incoming Interact club officers and committee chairs.

5.19. Financing the cost of the Interact program District Interact Finances

- 19-a) All district Interact activities shall be financed by the Interact clubs in the district.
- 19 b) No part of the expenses of district Interact representatives, district Interact conferences, meetings of Interact clubs, or groups of Interact clubs shall be paid by Rotary International.
- <u>c)</u> The district should make provisions to fund the administrative activities of the district Interact committee.

<u>41.010.12.</u> 20.Multidistrict Interact Meetings

<u>1.</u> Meetings of Interact club members from more than one district are to be held under the guidance of the

host governor and the district Interact committee. Such meetings are subject to RI youth protection policies and the advance approval of the governors of the districts involved. Invitations to governors to hold multidistrict Interact meetings must be accompanied by

- a) information including the date, location, purpose, program and participants of the proposed meeting
- b) a copy of the anticipated meeting budget with assurance that the sponsors are in a position to and will assume complete responsibility for contractual and financial obligations inherent in the meeting
- c) plans for adult supervision of Interactors and details about appropriate sleeping accommodations
- d) assurance that the planning and implementation of the proposed meeting will be carried out under the direct supervision of Rotarians
- 2. The host club or district must maintain liability insurance for multidistrict Interact meetings with coverage and limits appropriate for the geographic location. Evidence of such coverage must be provided to RI or the governor of any participating district upon request.

<u>41.010.13.</u> 21. Travel Insurance for Interactors

Clubs and districts inviting members of Interact clubs to participate in the programs or activities of such clubs or districts outside of their local community should, when Interactors are traveling 150 miles away from home residence or out of the home country, require the parents or legal guardians of each Interactor to provide travel insurance for the Interactor, which includes such coverages as medical (when traveling outside home country), emergency medical evacuation, repatriation of remains, and legal liability, in amounts satisfactory to the club or district organizing the event, with coverage from the time of the Interactors departure from home until the return home.

<u>41.010.14.</u> <u>41.010.1.</u> <u>RI Secretariat Service to</u> <u>Interact Clubs</u>

1. The general secretary certifies organization of new Interact clubs, produces program publications, distributes annual communications to all Interact

clubs, sponsor clubs, and district Interact committee chairs, promotes World Interact Week, and supports youth protection initiatives.

- <u>2.</u> 41.010.2. RI Certification of Interact Clubs The general secretary processes certification of Interact clubs. The approval of the district governor is required as a prerequisite to certification.
- 3. 16. As a matter of policy, the Board does not recognize the right of any individual or organization except RI to circularize Interact clubs for any commercial or other purpose.
- 12. The Interact name and logo, as used in or applied to the Interact program, are the property of Rotary International and shall be preserved for the exclusive use of those involved in the Interact program, including duly established Interact clubs and their members in good standing.
- 19. e) Rotary and/or Rotaract clubs sponsoring Interact clubs should not contribute more than occasional or incidental financial assistance to such Interact clubs.

APPENDIX H

AMENDMENTS TO PROPOSED LEGISLATION FOR THE 2022 COUNCIL ON LEGISLATION (Decision 108)

PROPOSED ENACTMENT 22-71

To provide for the administration of clubs in a pilot project

Proposer(s): Board of Directors of RI

Rotary Club of Merimbula, District 9705, Australia

To amend the **BYLAWS** of Rotary International as follows

Article 14 Administrative Groups and Administrative Territorial Unit

14.020. Supervision.

The board may establish a method of supervision in addition to the supervision by the governors of the clubs within any area composed of two or more geographically contiguous districts. If the board establishes a method of supervision, it shall prescribe rules of procedure, which must be approved by the clubs in those districts and by a convention.

14.030. Supervision Through a Pilot Project.

The Board may establish pilot projects as a method of supervision of clubs subject to approval by all impacted districts. Only clubs located within RIBI and/or within a zone that includes Australia or New Zealand can be included in a pilot project. The Board may establish the governance rules and procedures for such districts not in accordance with sections:

- (a) 7.020. and 7.030. (Proposing and Endorsing Legislation);
- (b) 8.030. and 8.040. (Proposing and Endorsing Resolutions);
- (c) 15.020. 15.060. (District Meetings and District Fund); and (d) 16.020. (Deriver of a Compared)

(d) 16.030. (Duties of a Governor)

PURPOSE AND EFFECT

The purpose of this enactment is to allow the Board to support pilot efforts in two regions of the Rotary world.

The effort will focus on innovative ways to support our existing clubs, Rotarians, and Rotaractors within the following two regions:

- 1) Great Britain and Ireland, and
- 2) New Zealand, Australia, and specific Pacific Island nations, which are part of what is currently identified as Rotary Zone 8.

No other part of the Rotary world will be part of the pilot programs. The pilot efforts will not impact club structures in any way, but instead, will test new ways to provide more localized support and a regional governance structure.

Both regions involved have shown an interest in being part of a pilot. Each region has experienced a very significant net decrease in membership over the last decade. Average club size has decreased significantly, the average age of the membership has increased and the overall health of the districts in these areas has suffered. The cost of inaction is significant.

This proposal is an effort to adapt and keep up with the pace of change in society and the increasing impact of technology on our lives. Most contemporary entities in today's global marketplace have significantly flattened their organizational structures to allow greater agility and more direct links between the leadership and grassroots levels of their organizations. But our support structure has grown in its hierarchy, with additional volunteer layers and roles being added over the years.

This proposal will test new models that can potentially enhance efficiencies; localize the programs, offerings, and tools provided to members; and explore new ways to make volunteer leadership positions more manageable and doable.

APPENDIX I

RESPONSIBLE INVESTMENT PRINCIPLES (Decision 110)

[Rotary International/TRF] acts responsibly and invests responsibly.

[Rotary International/TRF] recognizes that environmental, social and governance factors are material to the performance of investment portfolios, the objective of generating high long-term returns, and managing investment risk and aligns with its mission to act responsibly and create lasting positive change.

[Rotary International/TRF] will invest its financial resources and:

- promote alignment with its mission to act responsibly and create lasting positive change.
- incorporate environmental, social and governance factors into the investment analysis and decision-making process.
- consider investments which deliver tangible, measurable positive social and environmental impact in addition to the required financial return.
- be active and engaged owners and incorporate environmental, social and governance factors into the exercise of shareholder rights.

Selection and retention of investments

Maximum economic return is the primary criteria for selection and retention of investments, except in cases relating to the disposition of securities in certain circumstances described herein.

At no time will an investment be selected or retained for the purpose of encouraging or expressing approval of specific activities or, alternatively, for the purpose of placing [Rotary International/the Foundation] in a position to contest specific activities.

[Rotary International/the Foundation] will generally invest in companies demonstrating sound business practices, including a commitment to environmental sustainability, progressive work-place policies, responsible business operations particularly in jurisdictions that may not have a well-developed regulatory framework, ethical and visionary leadership, and strong corporate governance practices.

[Rotary International/TRF] will avoid investing in companies that have systematically failed to protect the

environment, human rights, workers, or prove unwilling to engage in a meaningful process of change and will typically avoid investment in companies with egregious environmental profiles, direct involvement with severe human rights abuses, pervasive or long-standing patterns of discriminatory behavior, a record of not addressing labor issues, and companies that derive significant revenue from producing, distributing, or marketing firearms, tobacco, pornography, or military weapons systems, cluster munitions, anti-personnel mines, and nuclear explosives.

Exercise of shareholder rights

[Rotary International/TRF] will exercise its right to vote on corporate matters and take such action to prevent or correct societal harm or social injury caused by a company's actions, products, or policies.

Where a finding has been made that a company's activities cause societal harm or social injury,

- [Rotary International/TRF] will vote, or cause its shares to be voted, for a proposition which seeks to eliminate or reduce the societal harm or social injury caused by a company's activities or develop a risk management regime,
- [Rotary International/TRF] will vote against a proposition which seeks to prevent such elimination, reduction, where a finding has been made that the activities which are the subject of the proposition cause societal harm or social injury, except in cases in which the proposition seeks to eliminate or reduce social injury by means which are found to be ineffective or unreasonable.

[Rotary International/TRF] will not vote its shares on any resolution which advances a position on a social or political question unrelated to the conduct of the company's business or the disposition of its assets. *Divestment (sale) of individual securities held*

Where applicable, [Rotary International/TRF] will sell a security in circumstances where a finding has been made that a company's activities cause grave societal harm or social injury and:

• it is unlikely that, within a reasonable period of time, the exercise of shareholder rights will succeed in

modifying the company's activities sufficiently to eliminate the societal harm or social injury, or

- it is unlikely that modification of the company's activities will, within the near future, have a sufficiently unfavorable economic impact on the company to cause [Rotary International/the Foundation] to sell the security under maximum economic return criterion, or
- it is likely that, in the normal course of portfolio management, the security in question will be sold before the action initiated by [Rotary International/ the Foundation] can be completed.

The office of investment will implement these guidelines in a commercially prudent manner based on its reasoned judgment and consideration of the facts and circumstances.

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
