MINUTES

of the

NOVEMBER 2021 MEETING

Rotary International Board of Directors

The Rotary International Board of Directors met in Evanston, IL, USA and virtually on 15–16 November 2021.

Present were: President Shekhar Mehta, President-elect Jennifer Jones, Vice President Valarie Wafer, Treasurer Virpi Honkala, Executive Committee Chair Peter Kyle, other directors, Jessie Harman, Susan Howe, Urs Klemm, Mahesh Kotbagi, Aikaterini Kotsali-Papadimitriou, Roger Lhors, Vicki Puliz, Nicki Scott, Elizabeth Usovicz, Ananthanarayanan S. Venkatesh, and General Secretary John Hewko. Trustee Dean Rohrs attended as Trustee liaison to the Board. Won-Pyo Kim, Julio César A. Silva-Santisteban, Shi-Tien Liu, and Katsuhiko Tatsuno participated remotely. Also present was President-nominee Gordon McInally.

At the president's invitation, also attending remotely were Directors-elect Jeremy Hurst, Drew Kessler, Muhammad Faiz Kidwai, Lena Mjerskaug, Patricia Merryweather-Arges, Patrick Chisanga, and Yoshio Sato. Ezio Lanteri was unable to attend.

Andrew McDonald served as secretary of the meeting with assistance from Matt Hohmann. Other staff present were David Alexander, Jim Barnes, Julie Burke, Paul Haisman, Brian King, Mark Lowry, David Peterson, Steve Routburg, Eric Schmelling, Tom Thorfinnson, and Nora Zei. Nobuko Andrews, Alain Drouot, Marc Prevot, and Eiko Terao served as staff interpreters.

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24. Minutes of the June, July, and August 2021 Board Meetings

Statement: The general secretary distributed the June, July, and August 2021 Board meeting minutes to each director.

DECISION: The Board approves the June, July, and August 2021 Board meeting minutes as distributed.

25. Ratification of Decisions Made by the President

Statement: As authorized, 2020–21 President Knaack and 2021–22 President Mehta took decisions on behalf

of the Board to fill vacancies in the office of governor or governor-elect and to approve waivers for the qualifications of a governor-nominee, per the RI Bylaws.

DECISION: The Board ratifies the decisions shown in Appendix A made on behalf of the Board by President Knaack during the period 15 May through 30 June 2021 and President Mehta from 1 July through 10 September 2021.

26. Ratification of Decisions Made by the General Secretary

Statement: As authorized, the general secretary took various decisions on behalf of the Board including on such topics as admitting clubs into RI, amending club constitutions, excusing clubs from indebtedness, extending a governor's deadline for submitting allocation expense reports, extending a district's time limit for governor selection, modifying district boundaries, canceling club charters, recognizing new Rotary Fellowships, and approving requests to join multidistrict information organizations, among other approvals authorized by the Board.

DECISION: The Board ratifies the decisions shown in Appendix B made by the general secretary on behalf of the Board during the period 15 May through 17 September 2021.

27. Decision by Communication

Statement: Under Illinois state law, a board of directors may take action by ballot without a meeting if such action, provided in writing, is approved by all directors. Since its last meeting, the Board took one decision by communication.

DECISION: The Board notes that it made one decision by communication since its 18–19 June 2021 meeting:

Ballot 1: The Board adopted, effective on 1 July 2021, all decisions it had approved at its 18–19 June 2021 meeting.

28. General Secretary's Report

Statement: In addition to his written report summarizing Secretariat achievements in 2020–21, the general secretary reported on the work at the Secretariat since the Board's August 2021 meeting and progress on Secretariat initiatives during 2021–22. He also reported on the new COVID-19 protocols in place at One Rotary Center.

DECISION: The Board receives the general secretary's report on the activities at the Secretariat since the August 2021 Board meeting.

29. Reelection of the General Secretary

Statement: Under Board policy, the general secretary is to notify the Board's Executive Committee at least one year before the expiration of his employment contract as the RI general secretary whether he wishes to renew the contract. As General Secretary Hewko's contract with Rotary expires on 30 June 2023, he notified the Executive Committee that he wished to renew the contract. The Executive Committee informed the Board of this request.

DECISION: The Board, in accordance with RI Bylaws section 6.040., reelects John Hewko as the general secretary of Rotary International for an additional three-year term, beginning 1 July 2023, authorizes the president to negotiate and execute the contract extension on its behalf, and requests the president to notify the Trustee chair.

30. Treasurer's Report

Statement: Rotary Code of Policies section 29.040.6. requires the treasurer to report on the status of RI finances at least once a quarter.

DECISION: The Board thanks Treasurer Honkala for her report on the status of RI finances.

31. Communications from the Trustees

Statement: Trustee liaison to the Board, Dean Rohrs, reported that at their October 2021 meeting, the Rotary Foundation Trustees took several decisions of interest to the Board. In their review of Stewardship concerns, the Trustees requested that the Board take action to terminate certain clubs in noncompliance with the Foundation's stewardship policies.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. notes the following decisions from the October 2021 Trustees meeting:

- 2. agrees to terminate any club that admits as a member any member of the Global Grant 1875701 project committee for their failure to cooperate with the Cadre.

32. Election of Foundation Trustees

Statement: RI Bylaws section 22.020. requires the president-elect to annually nominate individuals as Rotary Foundation trustees for election by the Board. In decision 140, April 2019, the Board requested future presidents to nominate no fewer than twice the number of candidates for election as Foundation trustee as there will be open positions (not including the position to be held by a past RI president). President-elect Jones presented a list of Rotarians for the Board to consider for election as Rotary Foundation trustees. The Board voted by ballot to determine those to be elected.

DECISION: The Board, following nomination by President-elect Jones, elects Alberto Cecchini, Martha Peak Helman, Holger Knaack, and Bharat Pandya to be Trustees of The Rotary Foundation beginning 1 July 2022 to serve terms of four years.

Note: Subsequent to this decision, the Secretariat received the resignation of Director-elect Ezio Lanterni. As Alberto Cecchini was the alternate director selected by the clubs in Zone 14 and will serve on the RI Board, he resigned as an incoming Foundation Trustee.

33. Petitions to the Board

Statement: The Board considered four petitions from Rotary clubs and districts:

• From Rotary clubs in Chennai, India, requesting the Board to intervene in matters related to the selection of the governor-nominee designate in District 3232.

- From Districts 2130 and 2140 (Belgium) requesting that the 2024–26 RI director be selected only by representatives from the four districts in Zone 13B (Belgium and Luxembourg).
- From the Rotary Clubs of Delhi South, DL, India and Deonar, MH, India requesting the Board to review the selection process for the Zone 4 Nominating Committee for RI Director.
- From the Rotary Club of Calcutta South City requesting the Board to set aside the selection of the Zone 6 Nominating Committee for RI Director.

DECISION: The Board, the Executive Committee acting on its behalf, requests the general secretary to follow-through on the petitions received at this meeting in accordance with discussion at this meeting.

34. Updates to the Rotary Code of Policies

Statement: Board policy requires the general secretary, at the conclusion of each Board meeting, to review the decisions taken at that meeting and to prepare a report listing the decisions that might be added to the Rotary Code of Policies. The general secretary provided suggested amendments to the Code based upon Board decisions taken at the June, July, and August 2021 Board meetings. The general secretary further recommended amendments to the Code to reflect current practices, language, and other factors.

DECISION: The Board, to record the decisions taken at its June, July, and August 2021 meetings, and previously, amends the Rotary Code of Policies as found in Appendix C, filed only with the official copy of these minutes.

35. Proposed 2022–23 RI Committee Structure

Statement: Noting that the Strategic Planning Committee would be recommending changes to RI and TRF committee structures at its November 2021 meeting (see decision 41), President-elect Jones, to ensure her proposed 2022–23 committee structure aligns with the new structure that the Board ultimately approves, requested deferring this item until the February 2022 Board meeting.

DECISION: The Board, at the request of President-elect Jones, defers consideration of the proposed 2022–23 RI Committee structure until the February 2022 Board meeting.

36. Election Review Committee Report

Statement: The Election Review Committee reviewed four election complaints received by the general secretary since the Board's June 2021 meeting and made its recommendations regarding these complaints to the Board. The committee also discussed the ongoing e-voting pilot in South Asia.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. receives the complaint of the Rotary Club of Perugia, Italy, concerning the election of the 2023–24 governor of District 2090 and based on the report of the Election Review Committee:
 - a. finds that the allegations of improper campaigning and misuse of the electronic balloting process are without merit;
 - b. notes the allegation concerning the governor's nullification of three votes, but observes that these three votes would not have changed the results of the election;
 - c. dismisses the complaint and confirms the selection of Rotarian Gesualdo Ariel Angelico as the 2023–24 governor of District 2090;
 - d. expresses its concern that this is the third election complaint in the past two years from clubs in this district and agrees to consider additional actions should this district continue to have election-related problems;
- 2. receives the complaint of the Rotary Club of Solapur North, MH, India, concerning the election of the 2023–24 governor of District 3132 and based on the report of the Election Review Committee:
 - a. finds that the minor changes made by the governor to the election schedule did not affect the election results;
 - b. notes that the concurrences submitted on behalf of the challenging candidates were validated by a district election committee;
 - c. notes that the winning candidate won by over 70 votes;
 - d. dismisses the complaint and confirms the selection of Rotarian Swati Herkal as the 2023–24 governor of District 3132;

- 3. receives the complaints of the Rotary Clubs of Islamabad Capital Hill, Pakistan and the Rotary Club of Islamabad Downtown, Pakistan, concerning the election of the 2023–24 governor of District 3272 and based on the report of the Election Review Committee:
 - a. finds that the clubs have failed to present evidence to support the allegation of campaigning and canvassing;
 - b. finds that there is sufficient evidence to support the allegation that the e-voting process was manipulated by the governor by deliberately preventing clubs from gaining access to the correct voting link so as to assist one of the candidates, which conclusion is also supported by the findings of a local inquiry panel created to look into these allegations;
 - c. upholds these two complaints, voids the election of Rotarian Salman Mubarak, and declares Rotarian Masroor J. Sheikh to be the 2023–24 governor of District 3272;
 - d. given the serious nature of his election-related misconduct, agrees that Rotarian Tazeem Ahmed shall no longer be considered a past officer of Rotary International and is ineligible for future RI appointments;
- 4. receives the complaint of the Rotary Club of Dhaka Dynamic, Bangladesh, concerning the election of the 2023–24 governor of District 3281 and based on the report of the Election Review Committee:
 - a. finds that the governor did not err by not allowing some clubs to vote due to outstanding district dues;
 - b. finds that there were significant irregularities with the e-voting process and, for this reason, voids the election and requests the governor to conduct a new election for the 2023–24 governor of District 3281 between candidates Nurul Kabir and Ashrafuzzaman Nannu, neither of whom were found to have interfered with the e-voting process;
 - c. requests the general secretary to remind the governor and all past governors in the district that any form of campaigning, canvassing, or electioneering is prohibited by the RI Bylaws;

5. notes the Election Review Committee's recommendation that the Board reexamine whether evoting procedures should continue to be used given significant allegations of malfeasance and hacking and agrees to consider whether the Electronic Voting Pilot should be renewed at its April 2022 meeting.

> DECISIONS 37–38 **Operations Review Committee Report** Virtual meeting 13–15 September 2021

37. Compensation Advisory Committee Responsibilities

Statement: The Operations Review Committee serves as the compensation advisory committee to the Board's Executive Committee. As such, the committee reviews and approves sources of compensation comparability data to be used for the Board's annual "disqualified persons" compensation analysis. The committee also reviews Rotary's current employee compensation strategy and recommends any necessary changes to the Executive Committee.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. notes that the Operations Review Committee has reviewed and approved the seven sources of compensation comparability data shown in the committee's minutes to be used for its disqualified persons analysis;
- 2. notes that the Operations Review Committee has confirmed—and the Executive Committee has approved—the current employee compensation strategy.

38. Youth Exchange Program Review

Statement: In decision 141, April 2021, the Board requested the Operations Review Committee, in consultation with the general secretary, to review the current appointment and succession planning policies for district youth exchange officers. The committee recommended a three-year term limit be set for the District Youth Exchange Committee chair and further suggested that the general secretary develop resources for explaining the importance of districts having a succession plan in place for this important role.

DECISION: The Board

1. amends Rotary Code of Policies section 17.030.2. as follows:

17.030.2. District Committees

• District Youth Exchange Committee

[text omitted]

4. Appointment of Chair:

Governors are strongly encouraged to observe a three-year limitation on the consecutive length of service of the district Youth Exchange chair. Because of the special knowledge and experience that administering youth programs requires, it is highly recommended that districts use a leadership succession plan, consulting all members of the committee as well as the governor-elect and governor-nominee, to draw from the expertise of experienced committee members and develop leaders within the committee. A minimum experience of three years in a key position on the district Youth Exchange committee is also strongly encouraged for established Youth Exchange program. The plan should also arrange for an overlap period, so that incoming chairs learn important procedures and policies from their predecessors.

To be effective, the district Youth Exchange committee must have continuity of leadership; therefore, effective 1 July 2024, the committee chair shall be appointed for no longer than a single three-year term, subject to review, with documented agreement of the governor, governor-elect, and governor-nominee for their term of service. The district governor (if selected) for each of the years of the maximum three-year term of the district Youth Exchange committee chair will participate in the selection of the chair. This selection should take place and be reported to Rotary International no later than 31 December before taking office on 1 July of the following calendar year. Any removal for cause must have the prior approval of all the district governors (if selected) for each of the remaining years of the three-year term. The general secretary shall provide district governors-elect with information about this policy annually, and provide guidance to district Youth Exchange committees on how to establish and maintain an effective succession plan.

- 2. requests the general secretary to
 - a. develop resources for incoming governors about the importance of succession planning in Rotary Youth Exchange;

- b. include language about the requirement for establishing succession plans in the certification requirements;
- c. communicate to incoming governors that these changes may be implemented over time, but no later than 1 July 2024.

39. Boy Scouts of America Bankruptcy Update

Statement: The general secretary informed the Board about concerns regarding the Boy Scouts of America's recent bankruptcy and the many sexual abuse lawsuits filed against the organization. The general secretary noted that while there is no formal relationship between Rotary and the Boy Scouts of America, some US Rotary clubs have chartered or currently sponsor local Boy Scout troops.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. receives the general secretary's report concerning the Boy Scouts of America bankruptcy;
- 2. authorizes the Executive Committee to act on the Board's behalf in relation to such matter, as further described in Appendix D, filed only with the official copy of these minutes.

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40. TRF COVID-19 Task Force Report

Statement: The TRF COVID-19 Task Force was created by the Trustees to provide support and direction to Rotary members regarding how they can best respond to the COVID-19 pandemic. The task force identified five areas of action: 1) community education, 2) equitable vaccine distribution, 3) combating vaccine misinformation, 4) stopping the spread of the virus, and 4) encouraging preparedness among local, state, and national governments for receiving vaccine. The committee met biweekly and discussed progress in these identified areas of action, and also discussed cooperative efforts with GAVI, the Vaccine Alliance, a proposed Rotary position statement on COVID-19, and establishing a recognition week for COVID-19 frontline workers.

DECISION: The Board

1. thanks the TRF COVID-19 Task Force for its report;

- recognizes the critical importance of continuing to engage Rotary members in efforts to address the COVID-19 pandemic;
- 3. adopts the proposed Position Statement on COVID-19 as shown in Appendix E and requests the general secretary to convey the Position Statement to Rotary members as appropriate;
- 4. agrees to designate a COVID-19 Frontline Healthcare Workers Recognition Week (exact week to be determined by the general secretary) in appreciation of the care and lifesaving work they have done throughout this pandemic and encourages all Rotary and Rotaract clubs to plan events or other efforts to promote this week of recognition.

41. Strategic Planning Committee Report

Statement: The Strategic Planning Committee met virtually on 13 September 2021 to discuss the recommendations of working groups the committee had created to address amendments to the proposed new RI and TRF committee structure, including committee terms of reference, and to ensure that these terms align with Rotary's Action Plan.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. thanks the Strategic Planning Committee for its report;
- 2. recognizes the critical importance of the Board and Trustees and their respective committees all working together to help ensure Rotary's continued success and to drive forward the Action Plan for both organizations;
- 3. recognizes the need for all RI committees and joint committees with the Foundation Trustees to be aligned with the Action Plan;
- 4. adopts the proposed new RI committee structure as shown in Appendix F;
- 5. agrees to form a joint working group of two directors and two trustees, appointed by the president and Trustee chair, to develop the terms of reference for each of the committees shown in Appendix F, for review by the Board and Trustees at their January 2022 meetings.

42. Constitution and Bylaws Committee Report

Statement: The Constitution and Bylaws Committee conducted business via correspondence in July, August, and September 2021 to amend Board-submitted legislation to the 2022 Council on Legislation and to review legislation and resolutions for the 2021 Council on Resolutions and 2022 Council on Legislation to determine if they were duly proposed or defective.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. noting that President Mehta found (on the Board's behalf and with the Board Council on Legislation Advisory Committee chair's consent) 36 files as duly proposed, requests the general secretary to transmit to the 2021 Council on Resolutions the following resolutions:
 - File 001 To request the RI Board to consider officially recognizing Rotary Kids as a structured program of RI
 - File 002 To request the RI Board to consider adding an environmental impact statement to enactments
 - File 003 To request the RI Board to consider amending the Recommended Rotary Club Bylaws to encourage clubs to invite the people and organizations that have benefited from its support to their meetings
 - File 004 To request the RI Board consider eliminating the role of assistant coordinator
 - File 005 To request the RI Board to consider encouraging all Rotarians to oppose the growing problem of modern-day slavery
 - File 006 To request the Trustees to change the allocation of the District Designated Fund and the World Fund
 - File 008 To request the Trustees to consider amending the fourth area of focus to include senior health
 - File 010 To request the RI Board to consider changing the Interact club application deadline for a Rotary Citation

Statement: The Council Operations Committee met virtually on 21 September 2021 to discuss how to safely implement the 2022 Council on Legislation in light of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. The committee also discussed updates on the Council on Resolutions and Council on Legislation, Council representative training, and assignments of legislation to committee members for further study.

DECISION: The Board

1. agrees to hold the 2022 Council on Legislation as both an in-person event in Chicago, Illinois, USA and virtually on 10–14 April 2022;

- 2. requests the general secretary to communicate this decision to the COL members and proceed with making the appropriate arrangements for the event;
- 3. requires that all in-person participants be fully vaccinated against COVID-19 and attest to that status by 1 February 2022 in order to register and book travel;
- 4. agrees to eliminate observers, except for official paid participants, as a registration category;
- 5. confirms that no travel arrangements for the 2022 Council on Legislation will be authorized that include pre-event travel and further agrees, unless authorized by the Council chair, that
 - a. travel arrangements and hotel accommodations shall be limited to the official paid participants;
 - b. no local purchase will be permitted;
 - c. post-event travel by the participants will be permitted at their own expense subject to the travel policy;
- 6. agrees that in-person participants will be required to abide by the health and safety protocols established for the in-person COL based on guidance from public health authorities;
- 7. agrees that virtual attendees may expense up to US\$350 for items needed to facilitate their virtual attendance;
- 8. affirms its commitment to the health and safety of all members and requests the general secretary to monitor the state of the COVID-19 pandemic in case the in-person event must be cancelled;
- 9. authorizes the Council Operations Committee, in consultation with the president, to act on its behalf if further decisions on the COL are required between Board meetings.

44. Council on Legislation Board Advisory Committee Report

Statement: The Council on Legislation Board Advisory Committee met virtually on 23 July, 7 August, 23 September, and 19 October 2021 to discuss the Board's legislative strategy, determining which items of legislation the Board may wish to support and oppose.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. endorses the legislative strategy presented by the Board Council on Legislation Advisory Committee at this meeting, as found in Appendix G, filed only with the official copy of these minutes;
- 2. authorizes the chair of the Board Council on Legislation Advisory Committee, in consultation with the committee, to draft comments for the COL vetting process and submit Statements of Support and Opposition.

45. Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Task Force Action Plan

Statement: In decision 184, June 2021, the Board noted that the DEI Task Force will use external consultant research findings to develop a DEI action plan. The Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Task Force presented an action plan based on five objectives: change management, governance and accountability, leadership training and educations, issue reporting and escalation, and engaging marginalized groups. The task force also presented a timeline of activities for each objective.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. thanks the DEI Task Force for its report;
- 2. agrees in concept to the implementation of the DEI action plan, as shown in Appendix H, filed only with the official copy of these minutes.

46. Reimbursements to the 2021 Taipei Host Organization Committee

Statement: In decision 104, January 2021, the Board, in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, canceled the inperson Rotary International convention in Taipei, Taiwan, and agreed to reimburse the Host Organization Committee (HOC) for mutually agreed upon expenses not otherwise covered by insurance or other reimbursement. The general secretary reviewed the financial statements submitted by the HOC and recommended a reimbursement amount to the Board.

DECISION: The Board agrees to reimburse the 2021 Taiwan Host Organization Committee US\$150,000 for the expenses incurred in supporting the 2021 RI Convention.

47. Rotary International Conventions in 2026 and 2028

Statement: With the cancelation of the in-person 2021 international convention in Taipei, Taiwan, the Board agreed that the Taiwan Host Organization Committeeconsidering that it had previously placed a successful convention bid-could bid to host a future Rotary convention without competition. The year 2026 had been reserved for a city that did not meet the critical criteria to host a Rotary International convention (per Board decision 156 April 2018); however, noting that the two finalist cities for this convention year-Krakow, Poland, and Manila, Philippines—could benefit with more time to prepare their bids, and noting that Taiwan could be fully ready to host the convention in 2026, the general secretary suggested the dates be switched and recommended that the Board select Taiwan for 2026 and reserve 2028 for either Krakow or Manila.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. thanks the Taiwan Host Organization Committee and the Rotary members of Districts 3461, 3462, 3470, 3481, 3482, 3490, 3501, 3502, 3510, 3521, 3522, and 3523 for their bid to host the 2026 Rotary International Convention;
- 2. tentatively selects Taipei, Taiwan, as the site for the Rotary International Convention on 13–17 June 2026, using the TaiNEX I & II as the primary venue, subject to the general secretary's successful negotiation of an appropriate block of hotel rooms, adequate space in which to hold all convention activities, a transportation agreement, thorough review of related tax implications, and any other agreements necessary to memorialize the proposal from the host area, and requests the general secretary to provide a status report at the January 2025 Board meeting;
- 3. confirms Krakow, Poland, and Manila, Philippines, as finalist cities for the 2028 Rotary International Convention.

48. 2023 RI (Melbourne) Convention Committee Report

Statement: In decision 109, January 2019, the Board tentatively selected Melbourne, Victoria, Australia, as the convention site for the 2023 Rotary International

convention. The Melbourne Convention Committee met virtually on 23-27 August 2021 to discuss stakeholder roles and responsibilities, reviewed provisions of the Manual for Conventions; a review of past convention evaluations to learn of any best practices or necessary changes for Melbourne; a marketing and promotions plan, including a convention logo and use of the Rotary Marks: possible sponsorships strategy; housing, registration, and transportation matters; a report from the Melbourne Host Organization Committee; strategies for delivering a valuable virtual component of the convention; how to highlight environmental sustainability at the convention; integrating Rotaract participation at the convention; convention program components; and budgetary concerns, among other topics.

DECISION: The Board

- accepts the proposal of Districts 9780, 9790, 9800, 9810, and 9820 to host the 2023 RI (Melbourne) Convention on 27–31 May 2023 in Melbourne, Victoria, Australia, with the Melbourne Convention and Expositions Centre and Melbourne Olympic Park as the primary venues;
- 2. acknowledges receipt of the preliminary draft program of events and activities for the 2023 convention, as shown in Appendix I, filed only with the official copy of these minutes, and authorizes the president-elect, convention chair, and the general secretary to continue to develop the program (to include event speakers that reflect a diversity in ethnicity, age, geography, and membership status, and with no more than 60 percent of one gender represented) with regular reports to the Board;
- 3. agrees, on a three-year pilot basis beginning at the 2023 Melbourne convention, to more fully integrate Rotaract's active participation in a Rotary International Convention in place of a separate Rotaract preconvention event, and approves an exception to Rotary Code of Policies section 57.110.3. regarding a Rotaract preconvention event for this purpose;
- 4. requests the Convention Committee to annually report to the Board the progress of this pilot, beginning at the October 2023 Board meeting;
- 5. agrees to reserve program space for the proposed Interact preconvention, pending further evaluation and recommendation from the Convention Committee;

- 6. in accordance with Rotary Code of Policies section 57.100.1. regarding the convention budget, approves a budgeted attendance of 17,000 and a marketing goal of 25,000 for the Melbourne convention;
- 7. grants an exception to Rotary Code of Policies section 37.010. regarding the guidelines for sponsorship of RI meetings to allow for the consideration of casino and gambling company sponsorships at the Melbourne convention, provided such sponsorships would not be contrary to any local laws and with the terms of any sponsorship relationship being subject to any applicable restrictions in the venue contract(s). If there is a merchandising component to such a sponsorship, whether to be used in association with promotional activities or for give-away or sale, and whether or not for fundraising purposes:
 - a. such related goods shall not contain the Mark of Excellence or the simplified Rotary wheel,
 - b. requests the Secretariat to work on a suitable substitute design for the president-elect's approval;
- 8. receives the recommendation of the 2023 Melbourne Convention Committee to establish a task force to review the delivery of future RI virtual and hybrid events [*note: see decision 49 of these minutes*];
- 9. grants a one-time exception to policy in the Manual for Conventions to allow the Melbourne Host Organization Committee (HOC) to retain budgetary and operational responsibility for the signature events at the Melbourne convention;
- agrees to delay the start of the three-year pilot to present the public-facing "Better World, Better You Festival" (Board decision 104, January 2020) from the 2023 Rotary Convention to the 2024 (Singapore) Rotary Convention;
- 11. thanks the HOC and the Melbourne Convention Bureau (MCB) for the generous financial incentive package to support the Melbourne Convention;
- approves the HOC preliminary budget and plans for surplus funds to be distributed to Districts 9780, 9790, 9800, 9810, and 9820;
- 13. approves the reimbursement US\$145,000 to the Melbourne HOC for their promotion and marketing expenses at future RI events subsidized from the

financial incentives received from Melbourne Convention Bureau;

- 14. agrees to provide the Melbourne HOC a forgivable loan up to US\$50,000 to support Signature Events project management;
- 15. agrees that the Melbourne HOC can request a loan of up to US\$220,000;
- 16. requests the general secretary to explore options to incorporate environmental sustainability into the event design for the Melbourne Convention to accomplish the following goals:
 - increase the visibility of Rotary International's environmental sustainability efforts and highlight Melbourne's environmental sustainability in promotions;
 - build sustainability initiatives that can continue for future conventions;
 - engage attendees in making sustainable choices as they participate in the convention;
 - teach participants ways to increase their sustainable choices in everyday life;
 - quantify the impact of sustainable choices made in support of the event;
 - leave a legacy in Melbourne;
- 17. approves the following budget considerations regarding the Melbourne convention:
 - a starting registration fee of US\$425;
 - the general secretary shall further develop the budget in consultation with the convention chair, vice chair, and president-elect, for presentation to the January 2022 Board meeting;
 - inclusion of a fee category of one-day only (Saturday) in the House of Friendship at \$60 and the opportunity for registrants to register for preconventions only;
 - makes a one-time exception to Rotary Code of Policy 57.100.6. regarding the convention expense reserve fund that staff expenses related to the event (estimated at \$1.1 million) be funded from convention reserves and not by convention registration fees.

49. Digital Events and Engagement Task Force

Statement: Noting the likely continued need to provide a virtual component to a Rotary International convention—even beyond those necessitated by the global pandemic—the 2023 Melbourne Convention Committee recommended that the Board establish a task force to develop a broad, unified, approach to providing virtual content and value to any Rotary convention going forward.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. establishes a Digital Events and Engagement Task Force to develop recommendations for the engagement of Rotary members and other participants in the delivery of future RI virtual and hybrid events and programming, including recommendations for structure, staffing, and policy, such task force to operate through 30 June 2023;
- 2. requests the president-elect to appoint up to nine members who represent a balance of organizational diversity and/or topical expertise;
- 3. requests the task force to provide a preliminary report to the Board at its June 2022 meeting with additional periodic reports throughout 2022–23;
- agrees that the task force shall meet virtually and by correspondence with one in-person meeting in 2022– 23;
- 5. requests the general secretary, in conjunction with the president-elect and the task force chair, to investigate the external resources, consultants, and funding needed to assist the task force in its work, for report to the Board at its January 2022 meeting.

50. Triennial Review of Rotary Institute Requirements

Statement: Rotary Code of Policies section 60.050. provides that the Board conduct a triennial review of Rotary institute requirements. The general secretary reported surveying institute conveners between 2018 and 2021. The survey addressed the issues of institute attendance and promotion, planning, programs and speakers, finances, and adjunct meetings. The general secretary reported that survey results showed that inviting a diverse group to attend an institute, improved the event's success. Noting the need to provide virtual content due to the global pandemic, the general secretary recommended that conveners be encouraged to continue offering an online attendance option. Director Kyle suggested the Board address concerns of financial liability for institute conveners.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. receives the Secretariat's triennial review of Rotary institutes;
- recommends that conveners, at their discretion, expand the audience of institutes beyond incoming, current, and past officers to encourage participation from other members in the zone(s);
- 3. recognizes that institutes can be conducted successfully in-person, online, or hybrid, to increase attendance, accessibility, and engagement;
- 4. encourages conveners to select a diverse group of speakers and facilitators for the institute and adjunct meetings;
- 5. requests the Operations Review Committee to explore ways in which the potential financial liability of directors/conveners for institute-related contracts can be mitigated or removed, for report to the Board at its April 2022 meeting.

51. Regional Leaders Qualifications

Statement: To help ensure the best candidates are considered for regional leader positions and to ensure these candidates will align with organizational priorities, the general secretary recommended changes to the qualifications for regional leaders to include "proven performance" in the regional leader's area of expertise.

DECISION: The Board

1. amends the Rotary Code of Policies regarding Rotary coordinator and Rotary public image coordinator qualifications, as follows;

29.020. <u>Rotary Coordinators (RCs)</u> [text omitted]

29.020.2. <u>Qualifications</u> RCs must have the following experience before appointment:

- service as a district governor or strong relationships with district and zone leadership
- expertise in membership attraction and engagement, new club creation, strategic planning, or Rotary programs proven

performance in new club development, new member attraction, or member engagement

29.030. <u>Rotary Public Image Coordinators (RPICs)</u> [text omitted]

29.030.2. Qualifications

RPICs must have the following experience before appointment:

- Expertise proven performance in public relations, marketing, advertising, media relations, or brand awareness and development
- service as a past district governor or strong relationships with district and zone leadership
- 2. requests the Trustees to consider the revised expertise qualifications for Foundation regional leaders at its next meeting.

52. Rotary Fellowships Policy Updates

Statement: The general secretary recommended amendments to the Rotary Fellowships policy that would reinforce diversity, equity, and inclusion goals in the program, clarify points of existing policy where questions have been raised, and to align established policy with current best practices.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. amends the Rotary Code of Policies regarding Rotary Fellowships, as shown in Appendix J;
- 2. requests the general secretary to amend the recommended Rotary Fellowships Bylaws accordingly.

53. Rotary Action Groups Policy Updates

Statement: The general secretary recommended amendments to the Rotary Action Groups policy that would ensure the transparent, inclusive, and efficient governance of Action Groups, clarify points of existing policy where questions have been raised, and to align established policy with current best practices.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. amends the Rotary Code of Policies regarding Rotary Action Groups, as shown in Appendix K;
- 2. amends the Rotary Action Group Standard Bylaws, as shown in Appendix L.

54. Environmental Sustainability Rotary Action Group Update

Statement: In decision 130, March 2021, the Board denied recognition of a proposed Rotary Action Group: EndPlasticSoup Rotary Action Group. The Board, however, requested that its initiators join the Environmental Sustainability Rotary Action Group (ESRAG) and further requested ESRAG to make the ending of plastic pollution one of its priorities. The general secretary reported that the two groups had been unsuccessful in integrating their missions due to differing organizational, membership, and financial practices.

DECISION: The Board thanks the Environmental Sustainability Rotary Action Group and EndPlasticSoup leadership teams for their updates and applauds their continued cooperation to support clubs and districts with environmental projects.

55. Interact Advisory Council Report

Statement: To improve collaboration with Interactors and to be better informed of their interests, needs, and expectations, the Board, in decision 38, September 2020, approved creation of an Interact Advisory Council on a one-year pilot basis. The council met virtually on 28–29 August 2021 and discussed a proposal for an Interact preconvention, possible improvements to an Interactor's typical pathway through the program, and how similar organizations with youth programs serve their members.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. thanks the Interact Advisory Council for its report;
- 2. requests the general secretary to develop Interactspecific resources to grow clubs, attract new members, and develop sustainable service projects led by young people—such resources especially for:
 - a. Interact club leaders in recognition that additional training and support will help Interact clubs;
 - b. Interact club resources to be accessible publicly on Rotary's website to better support Interact clubs and members;
 - c. attracting, engaging, and building knowledge and awareness of Interact through social media channels, especially Instagram;

- 3. supports the Secretariat connecting with other youthserving organizations to explore opportunities to collaborate and share best practices;
- 4. requests the RI president-elect and presidentnominee to reappoint the members of the Interact Advisory Council so that they might continue their work.

56. Leadership Development and Training Committee Report

Statement: In decision 65, November 2020, the Board requested the Leadership Development and Training Committee to evaluate 2020-21 training events and develop a plan for optimizing the successful outcomes of learning and training in a virtual environment. The committee reported that its analysis revealed several opportunities for improving learning outcomes, including showing that trainings are most successful with self-driven learning experiences, there is value in hosting in-person meetings, virtual learning should be conducted with specific time limits to be successful, and highly skilled trainers and facilitators are preferred over subject matter experts, among other findings. To ensure high quality and consistent training throughout Rotary, the committee recommended that all trainers participate a train-the-trainer session.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. thanks the Leadership Development and Training Committee for its report on lessons learned from virtual training events;
- 2. agrees that all GNTS and GETS trainers shall participate in a train-the-trainer session (to include a practice session with feedback) before conducting live training at GNTS and GETS;
- 3. agrees that all district trainers, district level facilitators, and anyone presenting virtually should complete the trainer courses in the Learning Center;
- 4. confirms that all training positions should be filled based on an individual's training and facilitation skills and not on seniority or position.

57. Sylvia Whitlock Leadership Award

Statement: In decision 170, May 2021, the Board, in support of increasing the number of women in Rotary and

women in leadership positions agreed in principle to a new leadership award named after Dr. Sylvia Whitlock (the first female Rotary club president) and requested the general secretary to develop award details for report to the Board. The general secretary reported working with the Membership Committee to establish eligible nominators and nominees, the award's timeline, and an evaluation plan.

DECISION: The Board amends the Rotary Code of Policies to provide for the nomination and selection criteria for the Dr. Sylvia Whitlock Leadership Award, as follows:

43.070. The Sylvia Whitlock Leadership Award

The Sylvia Whitlock Leadership Award honors one Rotary member per year who has actively worked to advance women in Rotary.

Eligible nominators and nominees

Any active Rotary member in good standing may submit one candidate for consideration, each year.

Any active Rotary member in good standing who has demonstrated extraordinary success in the advancement of women in Rotary, regardless of gender or tenure of membership, may be nominated. Members cannot nominate themselves, and may only receive the award once.

Selection of recipients

Past Sylvia Whitlock Award recipients and up to five RI Membership Committee members shall review eligible nominations. No more than one recipient shall be selected each year. Upon selection, the recipient will be announced and invited to be publicly recognized as appropriate and practical.

58. Membership Committee Report

Statement: The Membership Committee met virtually on 20 August and 29 September 2021 and discussed regional membership trends, integrating Rotaractors fully into Rotary, criteria for the Sylvia Whitlock Leadership Award, and strategies for advancing gender diversity in Rotary, among other topics.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. thanks the Membership Committee and Rotaract Committee for their report;
- 2. amends the Rotary Code of Policies regarding sponsor for new Rotary clubs as follows:

18.020.5. <u>Minimum Number of Members in</u> <u>Sponsor Clubs</u>

Both Rotary and Rotaract clubs may sponsor a <u>new Rotary club.</u> A <u>Rotaract or Rotary</u> club that wishes to sponsor a new Rotary club must have at least 20 members. Should there be two or more sponsor clubs, only one of the co-sponsors is required to have at least 20 members.

- 3. requests the general secretary to develop a comprehensive, operational plan for establishing Rotaract as a distinct membership type, for report at the April 2022 Board meeting;
- 4. endorses the recommended strategies to advance gender diversity in Rotary, as shown in Appendix M, filed only with the official copy of these minutes.

59. Report on Non-Club-Based Participant Model Test

Statement: The non-club-based participant model is an effort to support Rotary's strategic priorities and offer a different path to membership and engagement with Rotary. The goals of this model are: 1) to expand our reach by reducing barriers to connecting with Rotary, 2) to increase our awareness and engagement among new and diverse participants, 3) increase our impact by offering engaging service opportunities, and 4) to test the new model as a bridge between new audiences and local clubs. Integral to this model is the development of "Connect," an online community featuring discussion groups, volunteer matching, and mentor matching. The general secretary reported on the status of Connect's roll out in its two test market cities, Chicago and Houston, noting that while the global pandemic has paused inperson mentoring events, initial results of user engagement show promise for success of a wider roll out of the platform.

DECISION: The Board receives the general secretary's update on the non-club-based participant model.

60. Regional Membership Officer Staffing Structure Evaluation

Statement: In decision 163, April 2018, the Board approved new regional membership officer staffing structure and requested an evaluation of this new structure for the Board's review. In reviewing the outcomes of this new staffing structure, the Membership Committee reported that survey results from district and

zone leaders indicate that the staff structure has been well received, with increases in member lead follow-up rates and an increase in receiving relevant membership-related communications and resources.

DECISION: The Board receives the general secretary's update on the regional membership officer staffing structure.

61. Districting Committee Report

Statement: The Districting Committee met virtually on 14 September 2021 to discuss ongoing redistricting matters, review the status of those districts under 1,100 members, and review district-submitted reports, among other topics.

DECISION: The Board

- noting that their membership continues to remain between 1,100 and 1,199 members, requests Districts 1670 (France), 1911 (Hungary), 2201 (Spain), 2540, 2830 (Japan), 3420 (Indonesia), 4195 (Mexico), 4710 (Brazil), 9400 (Botswana, Eswatini, Mozambique, South Africa), and 9820 (Australia), to submit to the Districting Committee a district growth activity report by 30 April 2022;
- 2. noting that their membership growth has recently been between 1,100 and 1,199 members, requests Districts 1650 (France), 4100 (Mexico), 4240 (Costa Rica, El Salvador, Nicaragua, Panama), 5550, 7850 (Canada), and 6190, 7450 (USA) to submit to the Districting Committee a district growth plan by 30 April 2022 and a district growth activity report by 30 November 2022;
- agrees to merge the following districts, effective 1 July 2025, if they do not reach 1,100 members by 1 July 2023 and further requests each district to submit a district growth and consolidation report to the Districting Committee by 30 April 2022:

District 4670 (Brazil) with an adjacent district; District 4680 (Brazil) with an adjacent district; District 4720 (Brazil) with an adjacent district; District 5770 (USA) with an adjacent district; District 9350 (Angola, Namibia, South Africa) with an adjacent district;

4. defers consideration of whether to split District 3054 (India) into two separate districts until its January 2022 meeting;

- 5. splits District 3190 (India) into Districts 3191 and 3192, effective 1 July 2023;
- 6. does not agree to split District 9010 (Algeria, Mauritania, Morocco, and Tunisia) into two separate districts;
- 7. tentatively agrees to split District 9102 (Benin, Ghana, Niger, and Togo) into Districts 9103 and 9104, effective 1 July 2023, provided that the district has 20 or more members in at least 80 percent of its clubs and 90 percent of its clubs are at least three years old by 1 July 2022, in accordance with Rotary Code of Policies section 17.010.6.;
- 8. does not agree to pause any existing redistricting in progress in Zone 8.

DECISION 62–63 Communications Committee Virtual meeting 15 September 2021

62. Magazine Subscription Compliance

Statement: The Communications Committee discussed compliance with RI Bylaws section 21.020.1., which provides for Rotary members to be paid subscribers to the Rotary magazine and for the clubs to collect subscription fees and forward to Rotary. The committee noted that approximately 13 percent of Rotary clubs do not comply with this policy and that current policy does not provide consequences for non-compliance. The committee recommended new policy to address this concern.

DECISION: The Board

- 1. thanks the Communications Committee for its report;
- 2. amends the Rotary Code of Policies regarding Rotary magazine subscriptions to provide new policy for addressing clubs that are non-compliant with Rotary magazine requirements, as follows:

51.020.8. Noncompliant clubs

The magazines shall report all noncompliant clubs in their licensed area to RI twice a year at a time determined by the general secretary. The magazines will simultaneously notify noncompliant clubs using a message provided by the general secretary, which explains the importance of subscribing to a Rotary magazine, describes the consequences of noncompliance, and sets a deadline for compliance of three months (90 days) from the date of the notification. Clubs not complying within this period will be subject to the following, until such time as the club is brought into full compliance:

- 1) Individual club members shall not be eligible to serve in any district, zone and/or RI roles, whether elected or appointed
- 2) Club is not authorized to submit suggestions to the nominating committee for governor
- Club is not authorized to vote at the district conference, district assembly and in any authorized club ballot
- Club is not authorized to concur with any proposed legislation submitted to the Council on Legislation or resolutions to the Council on Resolutions
- 5) Club is not authorized to concur with a challenge to the nomination of a candidate for district governor
- 6) Secretariat services cease immediately, including services of The Rotary Foundation, such as the acceptance of new, or the processing of current program applications; and the recognition of clubs as sponsors or hosts of active Rotary Foundation program awards
- Club will not receive the following services from the governor: a monthly letter, inclusion on district mailing lists, and an official visit.

The magazines will notify noncompliant clubs using a message provided by the general secretary that describes the consequences listed above and copy the clubs respective district governors. District Governors shall be responsible for monitoring which of their clubs are noncompliant and for ensuring no members from noncompliant clubs in their districts are allowed to assume any district, zone and/or RI roles, whether elected or appointed and shall inform the noncompliant club president and/or secretary without delay, as soon as the information becomes known to them.

Clubs not complying within 6 months (180 days) of being notified may be terminated at the Board's discretion, in accordance with Article 3.020.1 of the RI Bylaws.

51.020.9. Communication and Training

RI shall communicate the importance of subscribing to a magazine and the consequences of noncompliance through training, as well as require each of the licensed magazines and the *Rotary* magazine to inform clubs and districts about this policy, either on their website or in an issue of the magazine.

63. Communications Committee Report: Virtual Club Meetings

Statement: In decision 101, January 2021, the Board requested the Communications Committee to consider developing guidelines for virtual presentations and a repository for their global use within and outside of Rotary. The committee reported on ongoing efforts at the Secretariat to support virtual presentations, including content updates to the Online Club Meeting page, featured stories on Rotary Voice blog, content in the *Rotary* magazine, spotlights on the My Rotary site, plus new content and resources added to the Rotary Learner Center.

DECISION: The Board thanks the Communications Committee for its report on Secretariat efforts to support effective Rotary club virtual meetings.

POSITION STATEMENT ON COVID-19 (Decision 40)

POSITION STATEMENT TO ALL DISTRICT GOVERNORS AND CLUB PRESIDENTS, From: Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation


We see the decision to vaccinate as a civic and humanitarian imperative. Rotary is not a political or religious organization, it is a service organization and this is the lens through which we are advising you of our position.

- Global vaccination is the path to ending the pandemic and the emergence of new variants. Rotary endorses and strongly encourages vaccination for all individuals including our members who are currently able to be vaccinated against COVID-19. In areas where COVID-19 is surging, communities are facing extreme challenges, health systems are overwhelmed, and contentious rhetoric is dividing us. It is critical that the virus be contained so that the world may begin to heal. To that end, the purpose of this statement is to reinforce Rotary's position.
- 2) Misinformation has become an "infodemic" that hinders the fight against COVID-19. In line with our Four-Way Test, Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation are committed to providing our members with science-based information.
- 3) Rotary staff at One Rotary Center were required to be vaccinated by 10 October 2021, as a criterion for employment after that date. RI's employee vaccination rate stands at over 99 percent.
- 4) Globally, Rotary is actively engaged in assuring equity in vaccine access to all people. Our efforts have included advocacy with the G-20, and a proof-of-concept program with GAVI/COVAX to leverage our frontline experience with polio eradication to facilitate vaccine delivery in several low- and middle-income countries where Rotarians are active. While we know many clubs are already deeply involved in COVID-19 prevention, we are working on additional strategies to multiply our collective efforts. GAVI/COVAX is a partnership including WHO and UNICEF focused on global access and delivery of COVID-19 vaccines.
- 5) Those children for whom vaccines are not currently available are at significant risk. Until vaccines are available for all children, the vaccination of adults is the best way to protect children who cannot be vaccinated. Pediatric

admissions for COVID-19 are rising precipitously in areas of low vaccination.

- 6) Rotary salutes health care workers everywhere as they continue to provide lifesaving services. Local recognition of these heroes by each of our clubs can help to encourage them to continue their important work. Rotary abhors any harassment and attacks on healthcare workers.
- 7) Rotary and Rotaract clubs are encouraged to
 - a. set good examples by being exemplary role models;
 - b. redouble their efforts to support COVID-19 treatment, prevention, and vaccination efforts.
- 8) Vaccines have proven to be one of the greatest advances of modern medicine. The World Health Organization estimates that vaccines save between 2 to 3 million children's lives each year, and the Global Polio Eradication Initiative estimates the polio vaccine has saved more than 19 million children from paralysis. Vaccines are safe, effective, and are responsible for eliminating or controlling many other vaccine-preventable diseases such as smallpox, measles, rubella, and Ebola. And now, there is the opportunity to end the COVID-19 pandemic through vaccines.
- 9) The eradication of polio remains a goal of the highest order for Rotary. We can apply the lessons we have learned in fighting polio to the efforts in responding to the COVID-19 pandemic.

APPENDIX J

AMENDMENTS TO THE ROTARY CODE OF POLICIES REGARDING ROTARY FELLOWSHIPS (Decision 52)

42.010.1. Terms of Fellowships

A Rotary fellowship is a group of individuals who globally unite around a common interest, vocation, or recreational activity with the primary purpose to network, and further friendship, and build community. Membership in a fellowship is open to any interested individual. Fellowships should be inclusive to participants from all backgrounds regardless of their age, ethnicity, race, color, abilities, religion, socioeconomic status, culture, sex, sexual orientation, and gender identity.

Fellowship activities must be conducted independently of RI, but must be in harmony with RI policy, including the use of the Rotary Marks. Fellowships may not be used to promote religious beliefs, political issues, or other organizations. Recognition of a fellowship by RI in no way implies legal, financial or other obligation or responsibility on the part of RI, or any district or club. A fellowship may not act on behalf of RI, or represent or imply that it has authority to act on behalf of RI. A fellowship is not an agency of RI. Fellowships must be self-sustaining financially. administratively. and otherwise. Fellowships may not exist or function in any country in violation of the laws of such country.

Individual Rotary Fellowships are not covered by RI insurance and are encouraged to assess their own risk and secure coverage as appropriate. (January 2020 Mtg., Bd. Dec. 100)

42.010.2. Criteria for Recognition

The general secretary recognizes Rotary Fellowships on behalf of the Board.

To be recognized as a fellowship, a group shall:

- 1) Have at least 25 members representing at least five countries.
- 2) Not duplicate the purposes of an existing fellowship, <u>Rotary program or Rotary Foundation</u> program.
- 3) <u>Not be utilized as a tactic to promote a service</u> project or program.
- 4) <u>Utilize a commonly understood name reflecting the</u> <u>fellowships' interest, vocation, or recreational</u> <u>activity.</u>

- 35) Be led by an active Rotarian, Rotaractor, or Peace Fellow.
- 4<u>6</u>) Have governing documents (charter, consti-tution, bylaws, or similar documents), which shall be consistent with RI policy.
- 57) Propose Create a web presence strategy (such as a website, social media page, etc.) website or social media page that contains the group's proposed name, logo, and contact information. The web presence and all communications must clearly indicate the group is proposed or in formation.

42.010.3. Maintaining Active Status

The general secretary will promote fellowships as member engagement and retention opportunities.

Fellowships <u>maintaining the criteria for recognition and</u> meeting the following criteria will <u>be considered active</u> <u>and will</u> receive promotional preference through Rotary media and at events such as the International Convention, subject to space availability:

- 1) Maintain a web presence (website, social media page) with current information <u>and approved name</u>, <u>logo and use of Rotary Marks</u>
- 2) Report their chair annually to Rotary International
- Submit an annual report to the general secretary by 1 September
- 4) Respond to inquiries from its members, prospective members, and the general secretary
- 5) Resolve fellowship disputes in an amicable manner

42.010.4 Governance

Rotary Fellowships must adhere to their governing documents (charter, constitution, bylaws, or similar documents) which shall be consistent with RI Policy.

All election and governance disputes shall be resolved amicably by the fellowship. Guidance from an independent third party may be sought to help resolve disputes. RI will not intervene.

42.010.5. Chapters

A Rotary Fellowship may form chapters to diversify involvement and increase its international reach. The chapters must use the Rotary Fellowships RI-approved name and visual identity with a chapter-specific identifier.

The Rotary Fellowship shall oversee its chapters and be responsible for their compliance with RI's policies. Rotary Fellowships may collect nominal dues from its chapters to offset administrative expenses incurred as a result supporting chapters.

42.010.46. Termination of Recognition

The general secretary, acting on behalf of the Board, may terminate a fellowship, with or without the consent of the fellowship's officers or members, for failure to comply with RI policies.

The general secretary, acting on behalf of the Board, may terminate a Rotary Fellowship in cases where the group has decided to voluntarily disband. Disbanded and terminated fellowships shall donate any remaining funds to The Rotary Foundation.

42.010.57. Statement in Publications

A prospective Fellowship must prominently identify itself as a "prospective" group.

Rotary Fellowships must prominently display the statement "This fellowship is not an agency of, or controlled by, Rotary International" or similar language approved by the general secretary in newsletters, publications, brochures, and websites. Following is an approved example of how such language may be incorporated into a statement describing the fellowship.

"The <u>Rotary Fellowship of Architects</u> International Golfing Fellowship of Rotarians is a group of Rotarians dedicated to <u>building a global community of</u> professionals within the architecture field to exchange ideas, provide learning opportunities and build friendship. promoting golfing as an opportunity for fellowship. This fellowship operates in accordance with Rotary International policy, but is not an agency of, or controlled by, Rotary International."

42.010.68. Agreements with Other Parties

Any agreement between a fellowship and other parties must clearly state that the fellowship is not an agency of, or controlled by Rotary International, an Illinois corporation, and that Rotary International is not liable for the activities of the fellowship. Any such agreement must also clearly state that Rotary International is not a party to the agreement, and that Rotary International is not liable for the performance of, or any obligation under, the agreement. A fellowship may not enter into cooperative relationships with other organizations on behalf of RI.

42.010.79. Youth Protection

Rotary Fellowships must protect the safety and wellbeing of all youth participating in their activities and comply with Rotary International's youth protection policies. A Rotary Fellowship may not grant membership or affiliation to a person who is known to have engaged in sexual abuse or harassment or who is prohibited from being a member of a Rotary club. (Upon obtaining information that a fellowship has knowingly failed to terminate the membership or affiliation of such an individual, the RI Board may terminate the Rotary Fellowship for failure to comply).

42.010.810. Fellowships at RI Conventions

RI will provide gratis booth <u>and meeting</u> space for active Rotary Fellowships in good standing, on a space available basis and when the budget permits, with the provisions that no <u>sale of goods or exchange of funds</u> fundraising may take place.

APPENDIX K

AMENDMENTS TO ROTARY CODE OF POLICIES REGARDING ROTARY ACTION GROUPS (Decision 53)

42.020.1. Purpose

A Rotary Action Group shall be an internationally organized group with subject-matter expertise and experience in a particular service area whose purpose is the advancement of the Object of Rotary by providing assistance and support to Rotary and Rotaract clubs, districts, and multidistricts in planning and implementing large-scale, community development and humanitarian service projects.

42.020.11. Services

Services include use of the Rotary Marks; and listing in program publications, <u>official directory</u>, and on the RI website; and priority access to booth space and meeting space at the International Convention at no cost, on a space available basis.

42020.12. Rotary Action Groups at RI Conventions

RI will provide gratis booth and meeting space for active Rotary Action Groups in good standing, on a space available basis and when the budget permits, with the provisions that no sale of goods or exchange of funds may take place.

42.020.1<u>34</u>. <u>Rotary Action Group Dues and Fundraising</u> Rotary Action Groups shall disclose how dues are used in their governing documents, and on their membership application materials. Rotary Action Groups shall prepare and circulate a statement of income and expenses annually to their members.

Rotary Action Groups may have paid staff. Groups may pay staff salaries and other administrative costs through membership dues, through project administrative fees paid as part of a grant, or through donations designated for such expenses.

Rotary Action Groups may solicit funds, including on their websites, from individuals and/or organizations, provided that donations are for the purpose of supporting:

- --a Rotary club, <u>Rotaract club</u>, district, or multidistrict project
- --The Rotary Foundation

--a separate implementing organization working with Rotary <u>or Rotaract</u> clubs on a project (provided there is no conflict of interest between the Rotary Action Group, its officers and/or directors, and the entity receiving the funds)

Rotary Action Groups may hold donations for the groups listed above in an amount not to exceed US\$100,000. Rotary Action Groups seeking to hold funds in excess of US\$100,000 shall first obtain approval from the general secretary.

42.020.178. Youth Protection

Rotary Action Groups must protect the safety and wellbeing of all youth participating in their activities and comply with Rotary International's youth protection policies. A Rotary Action Group may not grant membership or affiliation to a person who is known to have engaged in sexual abuse or harassment or who is prohibited from being a member of a Rotary <u>or Rotaract</u> club. (Upon obtaining information that a group has knowingly failed to terminate the membership or affiliation of such an individual, the RI Board may terminate the Rotary Action Group for failure to comply).

APPENDIX L

AMENDMENTS TO ROTARY ACTION GROUP STANDARD BYLAWS (Decision 53)

ROTARY ACTION GROUP STANDARD BYLAWS

ARTICLE I - NAME

Section 1.1. The name of this Rotary Action Group shall be _____(Rotary Action Group).

ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

Section 2.1. The purpose of this Rotary Action Group shall be...

This Rotary Action Group shall operate in compliance with Rotary International's policies for Rotary Action Groups, but it shall not be an agency of, or controlled by, Rotary International.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

Section 3.1. Membership in the Rotary Action Group shall be open to any interested individual.

Section 3.2. Membership may be offered on an annual basis. Multi-year and/or lifetime memberships may be offered at the discretion of the Rotary Action Group's Board of Directors.

Section 3.3 Membership may also be offered to Rotaract clubs, Rotary clubs, and districts on an annual basis at the discretion of the Rotary Action Groups' Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IV - BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 4.1. The Rotary Action Group shall be governed by a Board of Directors with no fewer than five members. The number of directors shall be self-determined by the Rotary Action Group's Board. All directors shall be active Rotarians. Rotaractors, or Peace Fellows.

Section 4.2. Terms for directors may last from one to <u>six</u> three years. Directors' terms are renewable for up to six years. After <u>completing a leadership term</u> six consecutive years of service, directors are ineligible to serve until three years have passed. Terms shall commence on 1 July of the calendar year elected and end on 30 June of the terminal year.

ARTICLE V - OFFICERS

Section 5.1. The Rotary Action Group shall be administered by at least <u>four</u> three executive officers, one of whom shall be the Chair (administrative head), <u>one</u> secretary, <u>one</u> treasurer, and one technical officer. Additional officer roles may be created by the Rotary Action group's Board.

All officers shall be active Rotarians, Rotaractors, or Peace Fellows. The terms of officers shall be staggered, shall not exceed three years, and shall coincide with the Rotary year, i.e. 1 July through 30 June.

Section 5.2. The officers shall perform the duties and functions usually attached to the title of their respective offices, together with such other duties as may be prescribed by the Rotary Action Group's Board of Directors.

Section 5.3. The Rotary Action Group Chair shall appoint a Technical Officer to take office on the next 1 July. The appointment shall be endorsed by two-thirds of the Rotary Action Group's Board. The Technical Officer role shall be filled by a member of the TRF Cadre of Technical Advisers with professional expertise in the Action Group's area of concentration. The Technical Officer shall serve as a liaison between the Rotary Action Group and the TRF Cadre of Technical Advisers and shall be responsible for maintaining and increasing the level of expertise in the Action Group.

Section 5.4.

ARTICLE VI - MEETINGS

Section 6.1. An annual meeting of the members shall take place at the RI Convention each year, or elsewhere <u>virtually</u> <u>or in-person</u> as determined by the Rotary Action Group's Board of Directors. At this meeting the installation of incoming directors and officers and other business shall take place. The exact date, time, and location of the annual meeting of the members shall be set by the Rotary Action Group's Board of Directors and announced to the members at least 60 days prior to the meeting.

Section 6.2. An annual meeting of the incoming Rotary Action Group's Board of Directors shall take place immediately subsequent to the annual meeting of the members.

ARTICLE VII - ELECTION OF DIRECTORS AND OFFICERS

Section 7.1. A Nominating Committee shall be appointed by the Rotary Action Group's Board of Directors and so indicated in a notice to the members. Notice sent by mail or transmitted via email to the last known address of the members shall be considered good and sufficient notice. The Nominating Committee shall receive nominations for expiring Director positions until a specified deadline, whereupon nominations shall be closed. The Nominating Committee may also offer its own nominees for election. All nominees must indicate their willingness to serve by a specified deadline to be considered valid nominees for election prior to their names being submitted to the Nominating Committee.

Section 7.2. The names of the nominees for Director positions shall be distributed to the members, along with a voting ballot, at least 30 days prior to the annual meeting of the members. Ballots may be sent by mail or transmitted via email <u>electronically</u> to the last known address of all members in good standing. Ballots shall indicate that they must be returned to the Nominating Committee at least seven days prior to the annual meeting.

Section 7.3.

Any effort to influence the selection process for an elective role in any manner, including campaigning, canvassing, or electioneering, is prohibited. Group members shall not campaign, canvass, or electioneer for elective position in the Rotary Action Group or allow such activity, for either themselves or others. Unless expressly authorized by the Rotary Action Group's Board, this prohibition includes any distribution or circulation by themselves or others of brochures, literature, letters, materials, electronic media, or other communications to any clubs or members of clubs. If a candidate learns of any prohibited activity, they shall immediately express disapproval and instruct the activity to be stopped.

Section 7.<u>34</u>. The Nominating Committee shall tally the votes cast and announce the newly elected incoming directors prior to the annual meeting of the members.

Section 7.5. A vacancy in the Rotary Action Group's Board of Directors, or any office, shall be filled <u>for the remainder of the term</u> by action of the Rotary Action Group's Board of Directors.

Section 7.6. A director or officer may be removed from office by a two-thirds vote of the Rotary Action Group's Board of Directors, or, by a two-thirds vote of the membership or in accordance with state or national law.

ARTICLE VIII - <u>ELECTION AND APPOINTMENT</u> <u>OF OFFICERS</u>

8.1. At the Rotary Action Group Board of Director's annual meeting, the Chair may appoint the secretary, treasurer and technical officer. Appointments shall be endorsed by two thirds of the Rotary Action Group's Board. Unless the appointed officer is a Director, he/she is not a voting member of the Rotary Action Group's Board.

Section 78.41. At its annual meeting the incoming members of the Rotary Action Group's Board of Directors shall meet and elect from its members the incoming officers of the Rotary Action Group, who shall become officers-elect on the first day of July following their election and shall take office on the next 1 July. As an appointed role, the Technical Officer is Appointed roles are excluded from the election process.

Section 8.2. A vacancy in any office shall be filled for the remainder of the term by the Rotary Action Group's Board of Directors.

Section 8.3. An officer may be removed from office by a two-thirds vote of the Rotary Action Group's Board of Directors, or, by a two-thirds vote of the membership or in accordance with state or national law.

ARTICLE<u>IX</u> VIII - FISCAL MATTERS

Section <u>89</u>.1. The fiscal year of the Rotary Action Group shall be the same as the Rotary year, i.e.1 July through 30 June.

Section 8.9.2. The Rotary Action Group's dues shall be set by the Board of Directors and shall be due on 1 July of each year. The Rotary Action Group's dues shall be of a reasonable amount.

Section 8.<u>9</u>.3. Funds shall be deposited in a financial institution approved by the Board of Directors.

Section 9.4. An annual independent review of finances shall take place following the close of the fiscal year and the Rotary Action Group shall provide a report to the members on the findings and recommendations of the review.

ARTICLE IX HARASSMENT-FREE ENVIRON-MENT

Section 9<u>10</u>.1. The Rotary Action Group is committed to maintaining an environment that is free of harassment. Harassment is broadly defined as any conduct, verbal or physical, that denigrates, insults or offends a person or

group based on any characteristic (age, ethnicity, race, colour, abilities, religion, socioeconomic status, culture, sex, sexual orientations or gender identity).

All members and individuals attending or participating in the Rotary Action Group' meetings, events or activities should expect an environment free of harassment and shall help maintain an environment that promotes safety, courtesy, dignity, and respect to all. All allegations of criminal activity should be referred to appropriate local law enforcement authorities.

Section 910.2 The Rotary Action Group shall promptly address allegations of harassment brought before it and shall not retaliate against those making the allegation. The Action Group's Board, or a committee appointed by the chair for this purpose, shall review and respond to each allegation of harassment within a reasonable timeframe, typically one month. If the chair or other leaders of the Action Group is/are the alleged offender, the immediate past chair (or most recent chair), directly or by appointment of a committee for this purpose, shall review and respond to the allegation. If the alleged offender is a member of the Action Groups' board, he or she is expected to recuse himself or herself from the discussion. The review and/or investigation shall be dependent on the circumstances including the severity and pervasiveness of the behavior.

The Rotary Action Groups shall report allegations of harassment to the alleged offender's club president and district governor.

Section 910.3 The Rotary Action Group shall protect the safety and wellbeing of all youth participating in its activities and comply with Rotary International's youth protection policies. Membership or affiliation shall not be granted to a person who is known to have engaged in sexual abuse or harassment or who is prohibited from being a member of a Rotary or Rotaract Club.

ARTICLE XI - COMPLIANCE WITH RI POLICIES

Section 1011.1. The Rotary Action Group shall comply with Rotary International's policies for Rotary Action Groups, as set forth in the Rotary Code of Policies. The Rotary Action Group's Board of Directors and executive officers shall familiarize themselves with these policies and any amendments to these policies as adopted by the RI Board of Directors from time to time.

ARTICLE XII - AMENDMENTS

Section <u>111</u>.1. These standard bylaws may be amended only by the RI Board of Directors.

Section 12.2. The Rotary Action Group must adopt RI's amendments to the standard bylaws once the general secretary communicates such amendments to Rotary Action Groups.

Section <u>H12.23</u>. Notwithstanding the above provision, the Rotary Action Group may adopt <u>bylaws and</u> administration procedures not in conflict with the provisions of these bylaws and the constitution and bylaws of Rotary International. <u>Updated bylaws must be</u> submitted to the general secretary for review and filing.

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
