PURPOSE AND EFFECT

25 26	Transpoundary Peace Parks, due to their location, are pathways to peace.
27	There are four Transboundary Peace Parks at the Canada-USA Border, including
28	the Waterton-Glacier International Peace Park Association. This Peace Park is
29	known as the world's first Transboundary Peace Park and was created through
30	the combined efforts of Rotarians from both Canada and the US in 1931-1932. It
31	is an example for others to follow.

- In its mission statement, the Waterton Glacier International Peace Park 1 2 Association states that the park is open to Rotarians who have an interest in "...supporting and maintaining the development and promotion of Waterton 3 4 Lakes National Park and Glacier National Park as a symbol of friendship, cooperation and our commitment to building peace initiatives whenever 5 6 possible." The core theme states "We will support the work and mandate of both parks to provide educational opportunities for park visitors and the general 7 8 public to preserve the flora and fauna and the lands which make up the parks. We 9 will advocate with Rotarians and other groups who have similar goals for the promotion of peace, freedom, and equal opportunities for all." 10
- The Waterton-Glacier International Peace Park Association's Pledge of Peace is embraced by Rotarians on both sides of the Canada-USA border: "In the name of 13 all we hold sacred, we will not take up arms against each other. We will work for 14 peace, maintain liberty, strive for freedom, and demand equal opportunities for all. May the long existing peace between our nations stimulate other peoples to follow this example."
- Transboundary Peace Parks are possible and achievable worldwide, and well 19 worth the effort. They are a positive step in promoting peace between two 20 countries. Future Transboundary Peace Parks may wish to follow the Waterton-21 Glacier International Peace Park Association's blueprint and ideals. 22
