WHEREAS, member retention requires serious consideration, and it is our belief that the issue can be addressed by simply showing respect for those members who have served Rotary for a long period of time, and

WHEREAS, in particular, RI and Rotary Korea should actively consider and implement special awards for outstanding attendance, combining these with a special commendation for exceptionally long-serving Rotarians, in order to honor and show gratitude to these individuals, and
