RESOLUTION 25R-23

To request the RI Board to consider amending subsection 20.030.1. of the Rotary Code of Policies on the qualifications and selection of president's representatives

Proposer(s): District 3600, Korea

WHEREAS, in January 2023, the RI Board took a decision regarding the qualifications and selection process for the RI president's representative, and

WHEREAS, this decision is now reflected in the Rotary Code of Policies as follows:

Article 20. District Meetings

20.030. President's Representative at Conference

20.030.1. Qualifications and Selection of President's Representatives

The president's representative represents the RI president at the conference by presenting inspirational, motivational, and educational addresses. In selecting representatives, the president should consider public speaking, relevant language abilities, the expertise of the individual in specific areas where the district requires additional support, and the cost effectiveness of the appointment. The president should make these appointments as early as possible and provide the representatives with background materials well in advance of the conference. President's representatives shall not be appointed to more than one conference per Rotary year unless the appointments serve a legitimate business purpose and are authorized as an exception by the president, for report to the Executive Committee at their next meeting.

WHEREAS, according to this policy, the president's representative is to be appointed by the RI president. However, this raises a significant question: Is it truly possible for the RI president to personally select all such representatives?, and

WHEREAS, each Rotary year, over 500 president's representatives must be selected. It is hard to imagine that the president could be personally familiar with all the potential candidates. Key qualifications such as public speaking ability and language proficiency are difficult to assess without direct interaction or experience, and

WHEREAS, if the president does not personally know the candidates, it is likely that someone is making recommendations on his or her behalf. But how can one

be sure that the person in question is recommending someone who truly possesses the qualifications outlined in Rotary Code of Policies subsection 20.030.1.? If this person served as an RI officer many years ago, he or she may be quite out of touch with current realities, and

WHEREAS, for this reason, it is advisable that recommendations for this role be made only by those who have served as RI officers within the past five years, and

WHEREAS, looking at the situation in Korea, there are approximately 450 members registered as past governors with the Korean Rotary governors' council, and

 WHEREAS, it is unclear how the selection criteria for the president's representative are determined. Is this done under the authority of an RI director? Are members of the Arch Klumph Society given a higher priority among the nominees? Are selectees secretly assigned from a particular group? Even district governors are unsure about the selection process for the president's representative and find out about appointments by word of mouth, long after the decision has been made, and

WHEREAS, there is growing frustration among Rotarians at the secrecy surrounding the appointment process for the president's representative and the conflict it engenders in the Rotary world. There are even instances in which nominees for the role have refused to serve due to the lack of transparency and fairness in this process, and

 WHEREAS, each year, the RI president-elect requests incoming governors to submit in ranked order of preference (1st, 2nd, and 3rd) the names and districts of those who wish to serve as president's representative. One cannot be certain, however, that this process is being properly implemented in every district, and

WHEREAS, if the selection of the president's representative is delegated to another individual by the RI president-elect, the identity of that person should be publicly disclosed. It would further contribute to the transparency and general accountability of the process if such delegates were required to select representatives based on the decisions taken by the Board, and

WHEREAS we feel it is essential to maintain transparency throughout this entire process and believe that, as a matter of course, the list of those who nominate the president's representative should be made public each year, and

WHEREAS, it is often said that a Rotarian serves until their last day in life. We believe that former RI leaders and past district governors aged 80 or older should consider stepping back from front-line roles and entrust greater responsibility to their younger successors. This would be a meaningful step forward into the future for Rotary in Korea and the wider Rotary world

IT IS RESOLVED by Rotary International that the Board of Directors of Rotary International consider amending subsection 20.030.1. of the Rotary Code of

- 1 Policies on the qualifications and selection of president's representatives by
- 2 only allowing recommendations for president's representative from individuals
- 3 who have served as RI officers within the past five years, and limiting the number
- of times a Rotarian may serve as a president's representative to two.
